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Another Midway Show Tempts Football Club With Offer

But the Club Do Not Accept Proposition, Believing It Might Injure the Town. It is Now Up to Merchants to See That Footballers Do Not Suffer for Their Action.

Some days ago Mr. W. A. Field received a very tempting offer from the Joyes Midway Shows recently showing at Cobalt. The Joyes Shows were very anxious to come to Timmins and offered the Football Club \$600.00 spot cash down and in addition a bonus of 20 per cent. of the gross earnings for the week here provided the Club would pay the municipal tax (which cannot exceed \$50.00 per day, or \$300.00 all told) and the ground rent. This arrangement would mean at least \$1,100 or \$1,200 for the Football boys. It would mean that there would be no more financial worries this season. The team could go right through to Toronto, and the money would be here without further effort to meet all calls. All that the Football Club would need to do would be to allow the use of the Club's name by the Joyes Shows while here, and also, of course, to take the money.

But the Football boys after careful consideration have turned down the tempting offer, much as it would mean to them. When the Palmer Shows were here there was much complaint from the business men as to the amount of money taken out of town, compared to the little going to the Football boys. The arrangement offered by the Joyes Shows would give the boys a much larger slice of profit, but at the same time it would mean a big outlay for the town. It would mean that the town would lose \$5,000 or \$6,000.00 at the least, according to most calculations. The Football boys are inclined to believe that the town can not stand anymore rains on its purse like this. So the offer was let go by, as noted above.

It should not be forgotten, however, that the Football Club has to finance itself. If the boys go right through to Toronto, it will cost a bunch of

money. The boys will need several hundred dollars. The Joyes Shows would simplify the financing for the boys, but complicate the financing for the business men. The Football boys have taken their stand for the good of the town. It is now up to the business men to see that the boys do not go short. The public generally should give the Football Club such generous support that there will be no need for more midway here this season. If the boys need money for the Toronto trip the business men should dig down deep. It will be better by far for the town and for the business interests and for the people than any midway plan of financing.

ANNUAL HARVEST HOME SERVICE APPEAL OF S. A.

The Salvation Army is making its annual Harvest-Home Service appeal this month, and there should be ready and generous response in Timmins and district. Probably no single agency at work to-day in the Dominion of Canada does as much good to as many people in as many ways as the Salvation Army.
