**GOOD GAME WITNESSED
AT FOOTBALL BENEFIT**

But Not as Big a Crowd as the Cornish-Lanes, Match Deserved.

On Thursday evening last at the Timmins Athletic Grounds the Cornish One-and-All and Lancashire Football teams clashed in a benefit game for the injured players of the teams. The event was termed the North of England versus the South, and the North came out winners by a score of 1 to 0.

The Timmins Citizens' Band gave their services for the occasion, and provided stirring music before the match and at the half-time period. The attendance at the match was disappointing. The football fans did not give the support that seemed to be warranted both by the quality of the match and by the good purpose for which it was planned. The weather no doubt kept many away, as it was inclined to be dull and rainy, but even the weather should not be asked to take all the blame in this case.

The match itself brought out some very good football, and both teams were right in top form. The Lanes, pressed from the commencement, but play was soon transferred to the Cornish's territory and Harris gave Winters a hot shot to clear. For a time the Cornish had a large share of the play, and were given two corner kicks in quick succession, neither however, being dangerous. The Lanes, then took a turn and also forced a corner, which was cleared, shortly followed by another which was shot over. Cornish took the ball up to Winters who was called upon to save. Rigby got the ball and with a nice run down field and with a well-placed shot in the corner of the net had Parkins beat all the way. Play from then on was real ding-dong football. Half-time arrived with the score 1-0 in favour of the Lanes.

The second half opened with play going from one end to the other, both defences clearing well and the forwards trying hard to get in close. The Lanes, were hot after another goal and the Cornish trying for the equalizer. This brought out an exhibition of splendid football by all players. Richardson got the only foul of the game when he gently pushed Kitchen. A penalty was awarded and Jenkins took the kick only to have Parkins pull off a sensational save. The game from then on was of a high order but with no further score, the North beating the South by 1-0.

Mr. Tomlinson handled the game in very good style.

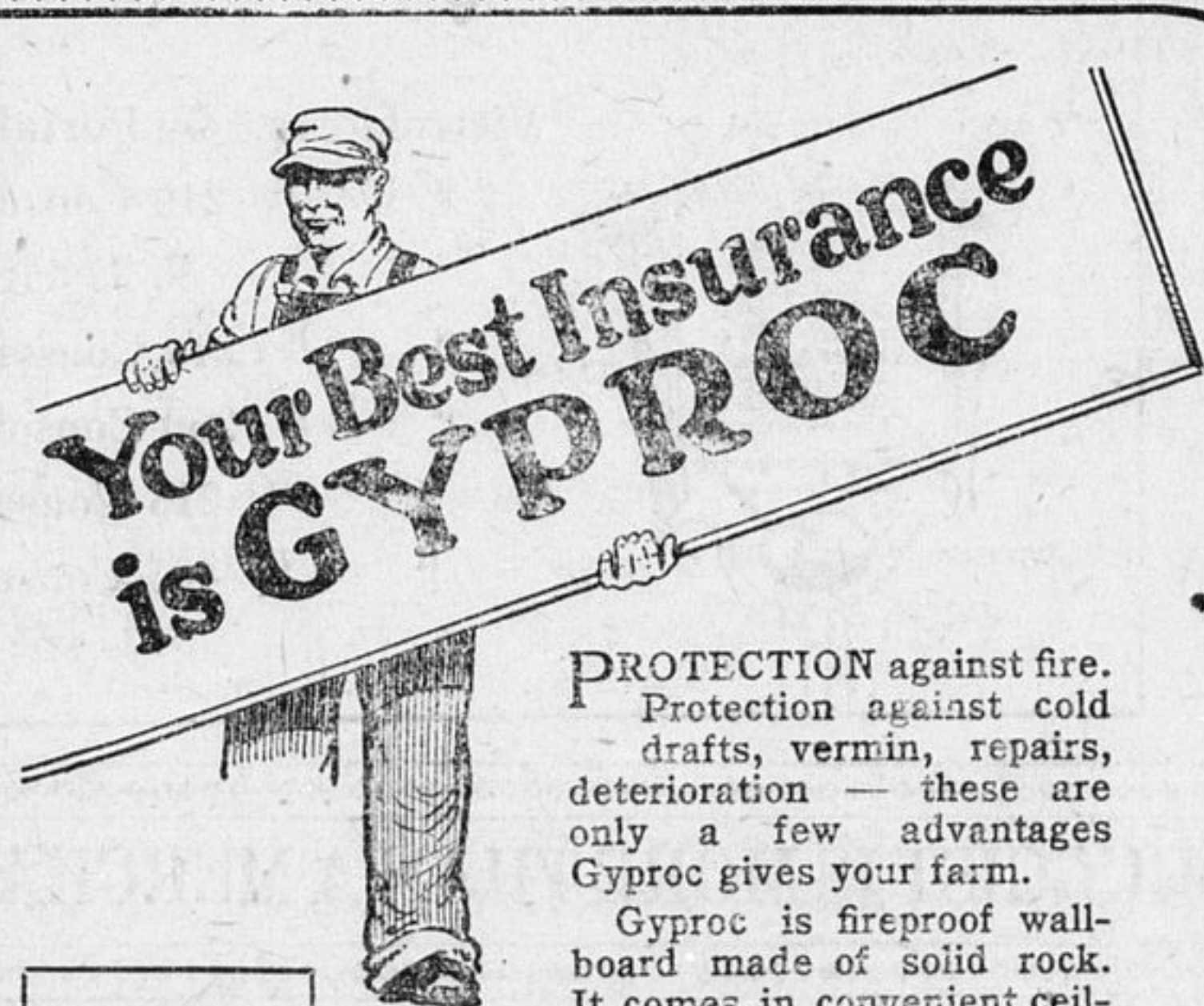
