**PEACE OF MIND IS THE  
REWARD OF CARE IN DRIVING.**

On Wednesday evening at the corner of Pine Street and Third Avenue there was an almost miraculous avoidance of tragedy. While an automobile was turning round at the centre of the road, a small boy ran across the road, evidently not noticing the car. The little lad dashed right against the car and those nearby thought that nothing could save the youngster from death or serious injury at the least. Before anyone could act, or even find time to think, the lad had struck against the car with such force that he fell down and it seemed impossible that the car could be stopped before it passed over the youngster's body. But the driver of the car proved to be unusually watchful, careful and resourceful. Still better, he was going so slowly that his car was in complete control. The car was stopped so quickly that the boy was saved. The lad was picked up and found to be unhurt. His mother however, was so overcome with anxiety that she had to be conveyed to her home. She expected that nothing else was possible but that her boy would be maimed or killed. The little lad owes his life, indeed to the skill and care of the driver of the car and particularly to the fact that the driver was so careful that he travelled very slowly at this busy corner.

The boy is to be congratulated on his escape. And the driver of the car is also deserving of sincere congratulations for what he escaped. There are few drivers who would not be worried to the point of torture if they maimed or killed a child. It would be small comfort to be able to say that it was the child's own fault. There is no excuse as good as the carefulness that makes excuse unnecessary.

The little boy was lucky. But the driver of the car was still more lucky, and his luck had the additional virtue that he bought it by special care and attention and good judgment.

**Over \$100,000 of Taxes Taken  
In By Collector This Week**

Seventy-one Thousand Dollars Totalled on Tuesday, with  
Thirty Thousand on Monday. Amount Taken in to  
Date, \$126,000.00. Date Extended to Sept. 22nd, for  
First Payment.

Monday and Tuesday this week saw an unusual line-up at the town hall, opposite The Advance Office. On Tuesday at least one thousand people were waited upon at the tax collector's office. The amount taken in totalled \$71,000.00. Monday was not quite so busy, but still it was a busy day. On Monday the total receipts were \$30,000.00. Up to date over \$126,000.00 is the amount taken in on this year's taxes. The big majority have managed to pay the first instalment of the taxes for this year. In view of the crowds all this week before the tax collector's wicket it was felt that Mr. W. S. Macpherson and his staff would have much difficulty in handling the crowds, and so the Council thought it best to extend the time for first payment to Sept. 22nd. This gives another Hollinger pay day before the penalty of five per cent. is put against the first instalment of taxes. It is likely that the next week will be very

busy for the tax collector's department, but, of course, not quite so busy as the first two days of this week. Now, the biggest portion of the first half of the taxes is paid. The biggest cheque received was from the Hollinger whose interests in the town are very important indeed.

Speaking of cheques, one of the requirements mentioned on the tax notice was that all cheques must be "marked" by the bank. Tax Collector Macpherson enforced this rule very strictly. One big firm that could buy out the whole town, if necessary, sent in a cheque unmarked. It was returned with the request, "Kindly have this marked by the bank."

Last year saw a remarkable busy time for the tax collection department about this time of year, but it was a slow time compared to the rush this year. "It gets worse every year, as the town grows," said Tax Collector Macpherson.

**TEN CHARGED WITH SALE  
OF LIGHTWEIGHT BREAD**

Only One Baker in Town Escaped in  
This Week's Bread Test.

About once a year the police make an examination of all the bread sold in town with a view to checking up on weights, etc. Although the Act under which this is done is a Provincial one, the work has to be done by the local police, but the fines in any cases brought to court go to the Province.

This week's work in the bread line by the police resulted in charges being laid against ten bakeries for offering for sale light-weight bread. Only one baker in town escaped. John Watt's loaves in each case weighed being over the required weight. Some of the loaves weighed in other cases were very little below the required weight, but on the other hand some of the bakers were apparently offering bread much below the right weight. The charges to come up to-day in this connection are against the following: Mrs. Gronland, A. Robitaille, Tony (Kirby Ave), Nap. Desjardines, Mackie's Bakery, T. Smith, R. Shiroff, A. Dewickere, M. and A. Patent, Schumacher Bakery.

To-day's court will have a varied list in addition to the cases above. One man is charged with having a cow running at large. One driving a car without lights. One parking a car on wrong side. One parking a horse and rig on the wrong side. One driving left side of silent police. One is charged under the Master and Servant Act. There is a case of the alleged theft of a table. There is a non-support case adjourned from last week. There are twelve more or less simple drunks. Wm. Leclair is to face a charge of having liquor in a public place.
