EVENING VOCATIONAL CLASSES

Timmins High School Term 1925-1926

Evening Vocational Classes will be opened in the New High School, Timmins, on Thursday, Oct. 1st, 1925, and will continue until Easter 1926.

Instruction will be offered in the following subjects:

English for foreigners and non-English speaking students.	Business Courses: (a) Short-hand and Typewriting.
English for advanced students (second and third year students).	(b) Book-keeping and Business Practice.
French (Conversational and Business).	Engineering (Heat Engines, Mechanical Drawing, Practical Physics and Chemistry).
Electricity (Theoretical and Practical).	Sewing and Dress-Making.
Mathematics.	Physical Culture.

ENROLMENT: Students may enrol for the respective courses any evening, in the principal's office at the High School from 7.30 till 9.00 o'clock starting Sept. 28th.

EQUIPMENT: The school has been fully equipped in all departments to meet the requirements of the various courses offered.

TEACHERS: The classes will be in charge of trained teachers holding certificates from the Department of Education.

FEES: A minimum fee of three dollars will be charged for each subject which will be returned at the end of the term to students that attend 70 per cent. of the lessons.

TO INVITE MEMBERS OF MUNICIPAL BOARD HERE

Board of Trade Extends Invitation. Other Business at Meeting on Monday.

Counter attractions apparently prevented even as good as usual an attendance of the Board of Trade on Monday evening, but the small attendance carried on and did the best possible with the subjects before the Board. The matter of delegates for the annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Associated Boards of Trade was left in the hands of the President and Secretary who are to see that Timmins has the five representatives allowed at this meeting.

The minutes of the previous meeting, and the correspondence read showed the progress being made in regard to business dealt with at previous meetings. This progress generally was satisfactory. In regard to the road to Whitesides, Keefer, Denton and other townships, the Government had promised careful consideration at once. The reply from the T. & N. O. relative to the carrying of prospectors' legitimate supplies and equipment as baggage, and also as to the return limit for automobiles shipped from the North, also promised careful consideration of the requests made, but pointing out that membership in the Railway Association limited action in some cases.

The matter of a parking by-law for the town was up for discussion following a reference to the fact that a Third Avenue merchant was circulating a petition to have it made illegal for a car to stop more than twenty minutes in front of certain blocks in town. The Board of Trade felt that until there was a parking space or spaces in town a parking by-law of the sort proposed would be an unnecessary hardship. On a previous occasion the business men themselves had been against such a parking by-law. It was decided to take this question up at the next meeting of the Timmins Board of Trade.

Some time ago the Timmins Board of Trade, following a long-standing and oft-repeated invitation, asked the co-operation of Toronto Board of Trade in getting the Government to build a certain road near Timmins for the settlers. The reply from Toronto Board of Trade roused much interest. The Toronto Board of Trade was anxious to help, but pointed out the difficulty of understanding conditions at such long range. The Toronto Board of Trade thought all such questions could be advantageously taken up at the Associated Boards of Trade. The Timmins Board fully believes this, but some members of the Associated Boards object to all such questions as being "local" matters. The letter from Toronto will be read at the Associated Boards meeting.

President Wallingford suggested that the Timmins Board of Trade extend an invitation to the members of the Railway and Municipal Board of Ontario to visit this Camp as the guests of this Board of Trade. The Town has frequent occasion to deal with the Railway and Municipal Board, and it was felt that a visit from the three members of the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board would be of all-round advantage. The members have never visited Timmins and a visit here would undoubtedly give them a much clearer appreciation of circumstances and conditions. The Secretary was asked to write the Railway and Municipal Board with a view to having them visit here as the guests of the Board of Trade. It is the intention to hold a banquet here at the time of their visit.

Among the resolutions to be passed on to the Associated Boards was one suggesting to the Dept. of Education that supplementary examinations be allowed in worthy cases where a pupil has failed on one or two subjects in the Middle School examinations.

SCHUMACHER SOCIAL CLUB OPEN DANCE ON FRIDAY

At the McIntyre Recreation Hall the next big attraction is the open dance on Friday the 18th, under the auspices of the Schumacher Social Club. This dance has some very special attractions which Club members claim will come as a great surprise to those who attend.

Although this club has only been formed but three months it seems to be going strong.

VETERAN HOUSE CONTINUES UNDER SAME MANAGEMENT

Some ill-informed person has been giving currency to a story to the effect that a change was to be made soon in the management of the Veteran House. Mr. Smith, who has conducted the Veteran House for some time past, points out the unreasonableness of this story, in view of the fact that he has a lease that does not expire until next April. Despite denials, however, the story had a tendency to persist for some reason or other, and of course such a story is not conducive to business for the Veteran House. Accordingly Mr. Smith desires it to be known that the Veteran House is continuing as heretofore under his management and that he is permanently located there.

BIG CROWDS ATTENDING JOYES AMUSEMENT SHOWS

The Timmins Football Club refused two or more very attractive offers in connection with the bringing of the Joyes United Amusements to town. The idea of the Football Club was that already this year too much money had been diverted to similar amusements and that as a consequence it would be in the general interests and especially in the interests of the business men of town not to have a show of this sort here again this season. There had been complaint when the Palmer Attractions were here that it meant the taking of too much money out of the town. However the Joyes Amusements came to town and stated that if the Football Club would not take them under the auspices of that organization the Shows would come anyway, "on their own." The Grounds Committee would not grant the use of the grounds at first, but the Joyes people secured a couple of lots on the corner of First Avenue and Maple St., and prepared to run their shows in any event. Then it was considered best from all standpoints to get a good rental from the athletic grounds rather than just hold back the grounds. Accordingly arrangements were made to this end, the Joyes people paying \$500.00 to the Grounds Committee for six days' use of the grounds. The Town license fee is \$100.00 per day, so that all told it will mean \$1100.00 for Town and Grounds.

The Joyes United Amusements are interesting, clean and well-conducted, and have been attracting big crowds. The success they have met with shows that there is still money for amusements. The special features include big merry-go-round, Elis Ferris Wheel, Trip to Mars, Vaudeville Circus, Handeuff King, Big Fat Lady, "Princess Della."
