**A PLAN OF SETTLEMENT
WORTHY OF CONSIDERATION.**

Recently Mr. S. V. Corliss, Canadian manager of the Mond Nickel Company, wrote a letter to the press suggesting a solution for some of the most pressing problems that face Canada to-day. The ideas in this letter do not appear to have received the attention or consideration their merits warrant. Mr. Corliss outlines a plan whereby Canada and Britain co-operate for the settlement of Canada's problem of immigration and Britain's problem of unemployment.

There is general agreement that the burden of taxation in Canada, the menace of national debt, the railway situation, and many of the other national questions that puzzle thoughtful Canadians, can only be solved through additional population to assist in bearing the financial burdens and in developing the resources and possibilities of the Dominion. Canada cannot proceed in safety along the present lines.

On the other hand the Old Land has problems even more serious. Chief among these is the unemployment evil with its attendant doles and other unsatisfactory palliatives. Britain is spending \$400,000,000.00 a year for its unemployed. Canada has spent, and is willing to spend large sums to foster immigration plans. The suggestion by Mr. Corliss is that Britain and Canada pool the expenditure for doles and for immigration, and formulate a plan for transferring some of Britain's surplus population to Canada.

Canada's need is men who will take up the land and farm. At this point most of the immigration plans have failed. Many good farmers have come out from Britain and settled in Canada, only to find that they lacked the capital necessary to establish themselves on farms here. They had to drop the idea of farming and thus they swelled the non-farming population and really added to Canada's problems. Mr. Corliss would have a fund for the assistance and financing of all immigrants coming here. With the use of the combined resources of Britain and Canada, all brought out here could be financed until they were able to look after themselves. They would then be great assets to this country. The surplus population of the Old Land would be necessary, and Canada would have the necessary increase in population of the most desirable kind.

The problems of Britain and Canada are big ones, and Mr. Corliss had approached them in terms of big money. In such terms only will they ever be solved. Without more population Canada can not be properly developed and will have difficulty in paying its way. Britain has a surplus of population, large numbers of whom are skilled in agriculture. If Canada and Britain can co-operate to remedy over-population on the one hand and under-population on the other, to avoid the disadvantages of doles and find a solution for pressing financial problems, a great work would be accomplished surely for this land and the Old. Mr. Corliss in his letter seems to point to a way to such a happy issue. Assuredly the thoughtful suggestions of Mr. Corliss should receive very careful consideration. In the North Land especially the suggestions made for the development of Canada along natural and desirable lines should be studied thoroughly from all angles.

**RIVER BLOCKED AGAIN
DURING PAST WEEK OR SO**

Complaints Again Being Made Regarding Interference With Traffic.

A couple of weeks ago reference was made to the visit here of a representative of the Department of Public Works, Ottawa, in consequence of complaints regarding the blocking of the Mattagami River by logs. It was thought that the warning given at that time to lumbering industries would surely be sufficient. Apparently, however, more drastic measures would seem to be required to make some of the lumber mills play the game fairly with the public. Complaints are again coming in to The Advance regarding the improper blocking of the river. One day last week a bunch of logs were allowed to come down the river loose and seriously interfere with traffic. On another occasion according to information given The Advance the river was blocked for practically three days. A motor boat could manage to force its way through but smaller boats were completely stopped.

The Mattagami River is a navigable stream. It is the only roadway in summer for many settlers, prospectors and others. The law requires that it should be kept open. Apparently there are some lumbering concerns who will not act fairly. If this is the case the Department of Public Works should take drastic action. The public rights should be respected.
