DISCOUNT ALLOWED TO ALL HOLLINGER EMPLOYEES

No Truth in Yarn That Some Employees Had Been Cut Off Discount List.

Last week some ill-disposed persons were peddling a story around town to the effect that certain Hollinger employees had been notified that they would not be allowed the discount of fifteen per cent. on all purchases made at the Hollinger Stores. There is absolutely no truth to this yarn. No change has been made in the matter of discount to Hollinger employees at the Hollinger Stores. All bona fide employees of the Hollinger are entitled to the fifteen per cent. discount at the Hollinger Stores. No Hollinger employee has been notified that the discount has been discontinued, and the whole story seems to be nothing but a spiteful lie.

Enquiry at the Hollinger Stores this week confirmed the opinion of several Hollinger employees who last week said they had heard no mention of any change in the discount plan and were sure that there was nothing in the yarn. The manager of the Hollinger Stores, Mr. Keddie, said that no change had been made in discount, and that, as hitherto, ALL Hollinger employees were entitled to, and would be given, the 15 per cent. discount in the usual way. He thought that the misunderstanding might have been due to the fact that one or two persons who were not Hollinger employees, and who had never been Hollinger employees, but who through error or otherwise had for a time been securing the discount to which they were certainly not entitled, had recently been notified that they were not entitled to the discount and that it would not be allowed in their case. So far as Hollinger employees are concerned it may be repeated that ALL employees of the Hollinger may benefit in the usual way from the discount clause by purchasing the coupon books as heretofore.

Agriculture in the North Aply Reviewed by Expert

Associated Boards of Trade Meeting at Cochrane Hears Inspiring Address From Mr. Smith Ballantyne. Address to be Issued in Pamphlet Form by Associated Boards.

One of the outstanding addresses at the Associated Boards of Trade meeting at Cochrane on Thursday last was the able handling of the subject, "Agriculture in the North Land," by Mr. Smith Ballantyne, Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Kapuskasing, Ont.

Mr. Ballantyne knows this North Land thoroughly and his long active experience in agriculture in the North has given him an inside knowledge of farming here that probably no other man in the whole district can equal. Further, he is able to put his ideas into interesting form, and all his facts are sure to be completely authenticated. He dealt at length in his paper with soil, climate, farming methods, proper seeds, the right lines to follow in this North, and many other matters of interest.

In concluding his address Mr. Ballantyne pointed out that he believed very sincerely that the days of doubt, pessimism and fear of failure are gone, and gone for all time, and that it is only a matter of time, coupled with hard work and perseverance and judicious management of soil, crops and stock, until the farmers of this North will be as prosperous and as contented as those in any other part of the fruitful globe.

It was recognized by all that even a careful synopsis of Mr. Ballantyne's address would fail to do it justice, and on suggestion of President Dewar it was decided to have the address printed in full in pamphlet form for general distribution. It will be one of the best advertisements for agriculture in this North.

A very hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Ballantyne for his excellent paper.

Both those who know Dr. Gagnon, formerly of Haileybury, and at one time a regular visitor to town, and those who are interested in developments in general in this country will read with interest the following from the last issue of The Northland Post Cochrane:—"The motor car is finding its way into the fastnesses of our countryside.
