Mr. John George Campbell Dies Last Week Near Sudbury.

The Sudbury Star on Saturday

last, Oct. 3rd, says:-"A pioneer of the North, one who played an active part in the constructive and industrial life of the country, was claimed by death yesterday afternoon in the person of John George Campbell, at his residence in Walford An eventful career was that of the late Mr. Campbell. He came to the North with a C. P. R. construction force while a young man, later he engaged in business, then he became interested in the mining game in which fortune greeted his efforts, his varied pursuits carrying him throughout the North so that his acquaintances include many of the old timers in Sudbury and district and in the Porcupine camps.

"The deseased, wno was in his 86th year, followed the construction of the C. P. R. to what was in those days the end of steel at Algoma Mills. After marriage, he located at Webbwood, from where he moved to Massey, where he acted as foreman for the firm of McDonald and Hall. Shortly after 1896, he started in business for himself, conducting a livery in Mas-

"When news of the gold strike in the Porcupine went broadcast, Mr. Campbell followed the trail further North and was appointed as Crown Lands Agent at the camp. Discovery of the Dome Mine brought him considerable wealth as he held an interest in the property.

"The funeral is being held tomorrow afternoon from his late residence at Walford. Interment will be made in Massey cemetery.

"Surviving are, his wife, four daughers, Mrs. John Wilson, of Walford, Mrs. St. Paul, South Porcupine, Mrs. Patterson, of Massey, and Miss Cynthia at home; four sons, John, of Massey, Frank, of Port Arthur, George, of South Porcupine, Edward of Sudbury. FINE SAMPLES OF COAL FROM NORTH OF COCHRANE

Frequently in the past there have been encouraging reports of big coal finds north of Cochrane, but nothing has yet come of these northern coal fields. On one occasion some years ago The Advance saw beautiful samples of the finest looking coal coming from north of Cochrane. About the only trouble with the coal was that it was easier to look at than to burn. However, other prospectors are said to have had better luck in locating beds of high-grade coal in the North. A great many prospectors and others who know the country north of Cochrane are confident that big coal fields will be developed there eventually. At the present time northern coal fields would be very acceptable in view of the way the southern coal supply has been kicking up. In this connection the following paragraph from the last issue of The Northland Post, of Cochrane, will be of interest :-

"Col. McCarthy passed through town yesterday from Fauquier, coming from the North. He carried with him some fine samples of coal taken & about 100 miles north. He has a diamond drill working on the property and has met with remarkable results ! at a depth of about 71 feet, striking a 144 12-foot vein of as good quality coal 33 as ever came out of Alberta. So far statement of Alberta. he has drilled at three places and the result he met with makes him enthusiastic of the future prospects of development of the mine."

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
