They did not, however, simply curse the luck and leave the country. Instead, they went into the promising country reached from Amos on the Transcontinental east of Cochrane. There they have been working for some time in Dubuisson Township. Luck did not seem to favour them until recently and had they not been good sports they would likely have dropped the prospect before this. However, last week word came to town that at the 120-ft-level they had made a nice strike—a 10-ft. wide vein of high-grade with lots of free gold showings and all the earmarks of a good thing. There will be general hopes here that further work will prove up even better. The Union Mining Corporation deserves a good thing.
