JOS. BRADETTE SAYS HE IS IN FIGHT TO FINISH

Is Out to Smash Machines and Will Not Withdraw.

Mr. Jos. Bradette, the Independent Liberal candidate for North Temiskaming, was a visitor to Timmins last week. He denied, as unfounded, the rumours that he had withdrawn from the field or that he had any intention of withdrawing. "I am in the fight to the finish," said Mr. Bradette. "I entered the fight to break the machine that is interfering with the will of the people, and I will not withdraw until the people have been given an opportunity to express their opinion—something of which party machines would deprive them. I will fight for the people to the finish."
Mr. Bradette had just concluded a tour of the Transcontinental where he met with much encouragement. In ten days he held twenty-four meetings, all well attended and enthusiastic. He believed he would be victorious in the election and that machine politics would thus be taught a lesson. He believed that his candidature would mean that in the future the people would be left free to choose their own candidates. "I appeal to the people," said Mr. Bradette, "as an Independent North Land candidate who knows the needs and possibilities of this country."

There was a report that the five escaped prisoners from Winnipeg jail had reached Temiskaming District and were hiding here. Then three of them were caught last week within forty miles of Winnipeg, hiding in a field.

SOUTH PORCUPINE MAN TO SHARE IN REWARD GIVEN

As an aftermath of a recent murder trial at New Britain, Connecticut, U. S.A., the information in the following despatch from Oshawa, Ont., is of interest in this camp. The despatch says:—
"Herbert Wallace Flintoff, Oshawa police constable, will share in the \$3,000 reward offered by the State of Connecticut for the capture of Giovanni Vottarri, of New Britain, Conn., slayer of a New Britain man, to the extent of \$400. Rocco Strange, of South Porcupine, Ont., will receive \$2,000. The balance of the award goes to the Police Pension Fund of New Britain. Vottarri was captured in Oshawa in a Bloor street residence by P. C. Herbert Flintoff, who later put in a claim for the reward. Other claims were also sent in and the matter has been under consideration for some months, the final award just being made. D. A. J. Swanson, prominent Oshawa lawyer has handled the case for P. C. Flintoff from the outset. He has been in Hartford for several days having just returned."
