"As one little example the following is the report of the findings by the Football Association in regard to the football team that violated Rule 14. The case was taken up and settled within a week. Here is an Old Country newspaper report of the incident:—"Grays Thurrock United defeated Hoffman's Athletic by ten goals to one, at Chelmsford, in the preliminary round of the F. A. Cup, but, a report having been received that they had played a reserve team, contrary to rules, the Football Association held an inquiry. A representative of Grays Thurrock admitted that a reserve team had been played their first team having taken part in a Kent League match against Tunbridge Wells Rangers. The Committee decided that there had been a violation of Rule 14. Grays Thurrock United were, accordingly, ruled out of the competition and fined \$25 and the tie awarded to Hoffman's Athletics."
