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Timmins Proved to be Too Good for Southern Champs

Claremonts Put Up Nice Game Here on Saturday, but Were Outclassed by Local Footballers. Score was 7 to 1, but Did Not Represent Difference Between the Teams. Good Crowd Despite Bad Weather.

On Saturday afternoon last Timmins Football Team qualified for the finals at Toronto by defeating the Claremonts, the champions of Southern Ontario, in the Ontario Cup matches. The game was an interesting one despite the fact that it was somewhat one-sided, the score being 7 to 1 in favour of Timmins. The score scarcely represented the respective merits of the teams for the Claremonts play good football. Better still, they appear to be a first-class bunch of good sports, taking the result with the best of grace. All through the match there was the finest good sportsmanship on both sides. The referee was good all right and very evidently knows the game but even that will not always protect an official. Saturday, however, there was never a murmur from either side. The boys just went on and played football. It was good football throughout, and though Claremonts were clearly outclassed, they proved to be a team of ability and with a courage that kept them working hard to the very last.

Claremonts have a classy little team but they are a little light for Timmins. Also, their backs seem to be a weak sector. Claremonts also lack the punch in front of the net, by not following up the ball. After the game in talking about their defeat the Claremont boys said the score was a big one, but there was no doubt but that the Timmins team was too much for them. "You have a great team," they said, adding that they were pleased to have played with such a team. "We'll be on hand to cheer you to victory when you run up against Hamilton Westinghouse in the final" they said. They were of the opinion that Timmins was "three goals better" than the Westinghouse and should sure win the Ontario Cup this year.

Timmins played a fine match throughout. As has been said before it is not easy to pick out individual players on the team for special mention, as they play so well as a team that it is the team work that counts. But in Saturday's game the way Liddle and Hetherington played is worthy of a special note. It was the finest display this season.

After the long and unnecessary delay in the Ontario Cup rounds and further delays by the Ulster Club, the semi-final had to be played in winter weather. While this not only hits the gate receipts hard, it is very unfair to the players to be asked to play on a snow-covered field as was the case on Saturday last, when the Claremont eleven came to Timmins to play in the semi-final. The Timmins officials did their best to clear the field of snow and managed to get the west side clear, but the east was still covered and was very slippery when the match was called. There were about 900 spectators present, dressed up for a hockey match instead of football.

Both teams were on the pitch at 3.55 and Referee Craig got them together at once, and away sharp at 4 p.m. Timmins lost the toss and Claremonts set them facing the sun and kicking in the north-end goal, while Claremont had the slight upgrade.

The teams were as follows:— Claremont—Morgan goal; R. Cowie and Pilkey, backs; Beverley, Barkley and Jones, half-backs; Evans, Riddle, Benson, Mitchell and F. Cowie, forwards.

Timmins—Erick, goal; Hetherington and Liddle, backs; Short, F. Cadman and Cooper, half-backs; A. Roberts, Cadman, Pettersen Satrang and Street, forwards.

Referee—J. E. Craig, of Toronto. Linesmen—B. Lambie, Timmins; and Meath of Kirkland Lake both N.O.F.A. referees.

Pettersen kicked off. Mitchell intercepted and sent the ball forward. Cooper returned it to Street, who got it down the field and centred. Satrang and Peterson got in close and Cowie cleared the ball. Street came in and took a first time kick and drove the leather past Morgan for first point in one and a half minutes of play. The ball went down again. A. Cadman passed to Pettersen. Morgan saved the shot. The Claremont team got away and worked well up the field. Hetherington intercepted and sent Timmins away again. Satrang scoring in seven minutes from a Street and Pettersen pass. F. Cowie got the ball and passed to Mitchell who ran up against F. Cadman and lost it. Fergy went down with Cooper in nice combination; Cooper drove in a shot which went over the crossbar. A. Cadman and Roberts started down the field; Alec was brought down with an injured leg and had to retire for three minutes for repairs, while Roberts carried the ball down and sent in a nice centre. Satrang took a shot which went wide. Claremont got going again with a forward move, Evans passing over to Benson and then to Mitchell who placed a nice centre but Benson failed to

follow up the play and lost a good chance, Erick clearing. In sixteen and a half minutes from the start Satrang made it three goals, Morgan having no chance to stop it, there being a misunderstanding with Cowie who unsighted him. Short got Timmins inside line going again E. Cadman, Pettersen and Satrang swinging the ball in great style, and worked close in Morgan grabbed Pettersen's shot up. Cadman rushed him. Referee Craig blew his whistle for dangerous play. Fergy got the goal kick and sent it right back. Morgan saved and got Evans and Riddle away from the goal. They worked hard with their other forwards and got in close to Timmins citadel, but Liddle and Hetherington worked a heady game and gave Claremont no chance for a shot. Street went away again. Pettersen ran too far and was called offside in taking Street's pass. The Claremont team, started to press hard on the left, working a nice combination which finished with Riddle driving the leather over the bar. They kept up the pressure and were awarded a free kick, Evans sending over a nice shot which Cowie headed wide. This was followed with midfield play, Timmins halves keeping Claremont at bay, Cooper getting Street away again. The latter's centre went out of bounds. Pilkey gave Timmins the first corner. Alex. shot Andy's flag kick wide. Roberts and Satrang have a try the latter drawing out Morgan and passed the ball; Roberts just missed by inches. Short got Roberts away again. Andy sent in a neat centre. There was a scuffle for possession. Pilkey relieved by kicking clear. Cooper getting the ball, passed it to Alec. Morgan saved at the expense of a corner from Alec, shot two feet out. The corner was fruitless. Satrang, Alex and Roberts went down in combination. Morgan again saved from the latter and in clearing the ball he hit Pilkey, the ball rebounded and just missed the upright for a corner.

The play had been going forty minutes when Claremont broke away and succeeded in evading the Timmins backs for the first time by nice combination and Mitchell finally landed the leather in the net. This put new spirit in their team and they pressed hard but were unsuccessful in getting through and the change over was made with the score 3 to 1 against them.

The second half started with A. Cadman off the field with the second injury he received in the first half, but he came on in a few minutes. The ball went out to Roberts at the kick-off and he went down in combination with Satrang and in two and a half minutes the latter scored off Roberts' pass. It was a beautiful low drive. Pettersen and Andy went down again; Andy shot wide. Claremont took up the argument. Hetherington intercepted and shot the ball back to Erick. Benson was right on Jimmy's clearance and sent the ball back. Erick grappled it, only to have Riddle and Benson right on his track and in getting away Jimmy was brought down, a free kick being awarded. Claremont still pressed and had the best chance of the match to score, but Mitchell carried the ball over the goal line. The play was transferred to the other end. Satrang nearly scored from Street's pass the ball coming back into play. Satrang drove in a hot one which hit the crossbar. Timmins thought it was in and started to walk back to centre field, while Jones kicked the ball to Evans, the latter getting away and there was some nice work by Liddle and Hetherington in keeping the eager Claremont forward out. It was a fine display the backs gave in the way they backed one another up. A. Cadman tried one on his own and made a great rush, breaking through the backs, only to shoot wide. This was followed up by a Satrang, Pettersen and Cadman rush. This was as fine a piece of combination as ever pulled off. Cadman passed to Pettersen. Cowie and Pilkey were waiting for him and it has them guessing, yet how Pettersen got through them to pass the ball to his fellow countryman, who scored on another great low drive; in 27 minutes. Short and Roberts on the left were turning in some great work and Roberts had some narrow shaves at scoring. He got in a beautiful shot only to have Morgan clear. Claremont went down again; Liddle again checked them up. The ball was kept in midfield for a time, until Fergy sent his brother Alex away again. This time he had the goal at his mercy, but was contented in passing the ball across the goalmouth instead of putting it in. Claremont took up the play again with some nice combination and finally got in another shot, Erick saving. Riddle sent in another and again Jimmy saved.

The ball went down again and after some passing close in Satrang got the leather by Morgan for the sixth in 34 minutes. Claremont went down

again but Jones shot over the bar with a long drive. Pettersen now tried his footwork and worked his way in, but shot wide. Again Claremont came down in combination. This time Mitchell lost another good chance by carrying the ball too far. In the last minute of play Pettersen gave a great display. Starting from midfield he dribbled his way through the Claremont halves; then both backs came over to meet him; he shot the ball between them and before they could think Pettersen was on the other side of them and driving the ball by Morgan for the seventh, half a minute from time.

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
