IMMENSE TIMBER LIMITS AWARDED BY GOVERNMENT

Three Areas of Pulp and Jack Pine in Nipigon Lake Section.

Last week after opening tenders at the Parliament Buildings, Toronto, Hon. Jas. Lyons, Minister of Lands and Forests, announced that the Thunder, Bay Pulp and Paper Co. and the Provincial Mills, Limited have been awarded by the Ontario Government three areas of pulp and jack pine surrounding the district of Lake Nipigon.

For the first time in history the Government reserved the right to sell the standing jack pine to other operators on the areas let to-day to each one of the pulp companies. The Government leases will specify that the product of the pulp must be finished into newsprint in Canada.

The areas comprise from 13,000 to 18,000 square miles each. The prices in all cases range from \$2 to \$2.25 per cord for the pulp wood, and from \$6 to \$8 per 1,000 feet for the jack pine. Two other tenders in connection with these have yet to be awarded as soon as the details have been worked out.

"The sale is a tremendous one," stated Mr. Lyons. "It will bring the production of pulp up to 1840 tons per day, and increase the newsprint production to 1,525 ton per day. The total investment will be \$41,500,000 and the combined plants will employ 7,680 men."

"It will be necessary to increase the power facilities of this production in order to obtain the 160,000 horse power necessary."

In explaining the reservation to sell the standing jack pine to other operators, Mr Lyons said it might take the pulp companies 20 years to finish the limits, and take off the spruce wood. By this time the standing jack pine might be too mature and would lose its value in the Government did not make this reservation. The companies securing the pulp limits will have to take the jack pine off as they go. The limits must be cleaned up.
