ATTORNEY-GENERAL ASKS CASE TO GO BEFORE JUDGE

Attorney-General Nickle has instructed the Crown Attorney at North Bay to make application for a new trial of the Hansen case before the District Judge. This follows complaint formally made to the Attorney-General's Department in regard to the Magistrate and Crown Attorney at North Bay. It is claimed that in the Hansen case there was a serious miscarriage of justice. Hansen was charged with being drunk while in charge of a motor car. He was acquitted by Magistrate Weegar on this charge, but heavily fined for reckless driving. The Chief of Police and three members of the force gave evidence to the effect that Hansen was drunk, but the Magistrate said that as they did not see him driving there was no evidence to prove that he was intoxicated at the time charged. Influential bodies at North Bay have made formal complaint in the matter. The North Bay Nugget suggests that there is talk of favouritism, etc. The Town Council has asked for an investigation into the proceedings of the North Bay police court, and that in the meantime the Magistrate and Crown Attorney be removed from office until the matter is cleared up.
