



ONTARIO'S MINERALS

The mineral resources of Ontario cover practically the entire list of metallic and non-metallics. Ontario possesses the largest individual deposits on the continent of talc, feldspar, mica and graphite. The greatest nickel mines in the world are at Sudbury, the largest deposits of cobalt and the richest silver camps at Cobalt and South Lorrain, and highly productive gold camps at Porcupine and Kirkland Lake. Ontario's gold mines are attracting world-wide attention. The production of this metal in 1924 was valued at \$25,669,262.

The mining laws are liberal, fair and just. A miner's license obtained from the Department of Mines or any Mining Recorder, costs \$5.00 and entitles the prospector to stake out three claims in each mining division in any year. After performing 200 days' work on a claim, patent is granted on payment of \$2.50 or \$3.00 per acre, depending on location in unsurveyed or surveyed territory.

Arrangements have been made by which parcels of gold ore will be purchased from prospectors developing their claims or others who may have gold ore to sell. Full particulars may be obtained from A. A. Cole, manager, Temiskaming Testing Laboratories, Cobalt, or the undersigned.

PROMISING CLAIMS IN DENTON AND CARSCALLEN

Beanland-Hurst and Hazelton Properties Showing Up Well

Assessment and development work on Mr. S. Beanland was in Timmins this week after a busy time at assessment and development work on the claims in Carscallen Township known as the Beanland-Hurst properties. This property is developing with very special promise. Mr. Beanland did not have much to say about the claims, though admitting that the more work that was done on them the better the prospects appeared. "There is nothing particular to say, and nothing particular to do, except to keep up the work on these claims and prove them up," said Mr. Beanland. He had with him a few samples of the "wire gold" found on the claims. So far as known this is the first instance in this part of the North of "wire gold" being found in development work on claims. The gold is found in wire-like form, the golden "wires" being from an eight to a half-inch in length. The "wire gold" is of quite frequent occurrence. Other free gold is also being encountered with pleasing regularity, while the general grade of the ore seems to be of rich type.

Mr. Beanland referred to some diamond drill cores he had recently seen on the Hazelton property in the adjoining township of Denton. "The cores showed an ore well mineralized and of most promising character," said Mr. Beanland, who added that the progress made by properties such as the Hazelton was most encouraging to all in the district. The proof of the reality of this encouragement is given by the fact that development work is now under way on a number of properties, including a group of claims held by Capt. Young, W. King and R. Eddleston, of Timmins. On these claims trenching and stripping is in progress with encouraging results. These claims are just west of the Beanland claims.

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

The regular meetings of the Town Council are scheduled for the second and fourth Mondays of each month. This month the second Monday falls on Thanksgiving Day, a public holiday, and as a consequence the Council meeting has to be postponed. Announcement is made by Mr. H. Charlton, of North Bay, secretary of the N.O.H.A., that the annual meeting of the Northern Ontario Hockey Association will be held at North Bay on Saturday, November 28th. Letters to this effect have been sent out to all the clubs concerned, but to the present there have been no replies. It is expected this year that groups in the N.O.H.A. will show little change from last year, further that Haileybury is expected to be a new starter. It is probable, also that this year, both Iroquois Falls and Timmins will specially emphasize Junior Hockey.
