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QUOTES TIMMINS CASE TO PROVE CANADA'S LOYALTY

Westminster Gazette, of London, Eng., Refers to Interesting Incident at Timmins

Among the British Press men visiting Timmins some weeks ago was Mr. J. F. Chapter, of The Westminster Gazette, London, England. A recent issue of The Westminster Gazette is to hand, containing the first of what promises to be an unusually interesting series of articles entitled, "Canada Re-Visited." This article deals in attractive way with the theme, "Jack Canuck and His Neighbour." It also quotes an interesting incident of the visit to Timmins, though this town is not mentioned. The incident of the saluting of the flag, however, was at the banquet in the Empire Hotel, given to the visiting newspapermen by the Timmins Board of Trade and the Timmins Kiwanis Club. The following is the article by Mr. Chapter:—The completion of a second Canadian tour, comprising a visit to all the provinces of that great Dominion, naturally suggests a comparison between what I saw in 1911 and the conditions present in 1925.

"Do you think the people of London are loyal?" a Canadian asked me fourteen years ago. "Why do you question such a thing?" I replied. "Well," said he, "when I was in London last year I went to a theatre, and it was not till everybody was going out at the end of the performance that I heard a single note of the National Anthem, and then only one verse was played by the orchestra. The audience didn't join in singing it!" It was not difficult to reassure my Canadian friend, but I wonder what his feelings are to-day?

So far as I could gather there is no general feeling of disaffection throughout Canada. Conditions vary too much for that. But occasions do arise when the possibility of annexation to the United States is referred to in the Canadian Press; and, I believe, is sometimes publicly discussed. Nevertheless, one of the most pronounced expressions of loyalty possible was given at a public dinner at which I was present very recently. "Gentlemen," said the Chairman, before the meal was served, "we will begin in our usual way with the salute of the flag." Thereupon the entire company rose to attention, and turned to face the Union Jack displayed in one corner of the room. In formal military style everyone raised his hand to the salute, and with one accord the 180 men present sang "God Save the King" with true Canadian fervour. That did not look like disloyalty, and it did, I believe, express the feeling of the overwhelming majority.

There has been, nevertheless, a very marked increase of friendship between Canadians and Americans since my former visit, due in a large measure to freer inter-communication. Canadians roads have been much extended and improved, coincident with an enormous new expenditure upon motor-cars. Many Canadians have thus visited the States who formerly did not go there, and the number of Americans who spend summer and winter vacations in Canada has of late been multiplied many fold. Many Canadians cities make special provision for the accommodation of these visitors by the establishment of free automobile camping grounds within or near their borders.

Thus encouraged, the American has not been slow to take advantage of the facilities offered him to visit the innumerable show-places and holiday resorts in the Dominion. Reciprocity in the matter of motor-car licensing and regulation has removed many obstacles, and he pours over the Canadian border in thousands of the 18,000,000 pleasure cars now said to have been licensed in the United States. To make this mode of travel still more easy, trail associations have been formed, and he finds his way along unfamiliar roads by the aid of coloured directors pointing out the Red Trail, or the Blue Trail, or what not.

No scenic attraction can well surpass the Canadian Rockies. They are proving a new "cash crop," the exploitation of which will do much to enrich, not only the people of British Columbia, but many cities and towns lying along the great highway which now stretches from Calgary, "the gateway to the grandeur of the mountains," to Tampico, in Mexico.

One natural outcome of all this newly developed intercourse between the two English-speaking people of the North American Continent has been a great increase of neighbourly feeling between John Canuck and Uncle Sam.

UNFATHOMED WEALTH OF CANADA TO BE DEVELOPED

Dominion Has Chance to Make Up for Exhaustion in Old Hands, Says Dr. Camsell

The world's ever-increasing need of material to meet the demands and the gradual exhaustion of Old World source of supply are factors driving towards the early opening up of Canada's unfathomed mineral deposits, Dr. Charles Camsell, Deputy Minister of Mines, Ottawa, declared in a comprehensive survey of the Canadian mineral trade, before the opening session of the annual convention of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy held at Winnipeg, Manitoba, last week.

After showing that Canada's imports in the metals and mineral line was \$124,000,000.00 in excess of the exports for 1924, though the year as a whole had shown a favourable trade balance, Dr. Camsell, pointed out that the deficit was largely due to the fact that Canada's exports were of the raw and partly manufactured products, whereas the imports covered the finished manufactured articles in such fields as structural steel, machinery, copper wire, gasoline and chinaware.

He declared he had every confidence that future years for a considerable time to come will continue to disclose new mineral fields in various parts of Canada no less remarkable than the discovery of the last 25 years.

"Not only am I convinced," the speaker said, "that Canada possesses great mineral wealth as yet unknown, I am equally impressed with the force circumstances which are ceaselessly increasing the world's mineral consumption, and which are compelling the older, highly developed countries, through exhaustion of their own natural resources to look to the newer countries to supply their deficiencies. These circumstances will, I believe, hasten the development of Canada's resources more quickly and more thoroughly than for any other reason."

SOUTH TEMISKAMING CANDIDATE LOST DEPOSIT

Harold Welch, the Progressive party candidate in South Temiskaming, lost his deposit in the recent election. Any candidate who does not receive half as many votes as the successful candidate has to forfeit the deposit. This, of course, is to prevent expense through a multiplicity of candidates running "just for fun," as the boys say. In South Temiskaming Mr. Welch only polled 1965 votes, while Mac Lang had 4548, and Col. Armstrong, Conservative candidate was winner with 5,394 votes.

CHARGED WITH ESCAPING MAKES SECOND GET-AWAY

While being transferred last week to the Sudbury District jail to await trial for escaping from Burwash, Norman Weir slipped the hand-cuff from his hand and disappeared over the C. P.R. tracks. Weir was being taken into the jail along with another prisoner and when he escaped, the guard, who had accompanied him from Burwash, could not leave the other prisoner to join in the chase.

The police scoured the country for over a day before they were able to locate anyone who had even noticed the escaped prisoner, but eventually a message was received to the effect that he had been seen at Sudbury Junction. Weir had stolen some clothes and changed from the prison garb and thus made a fairly easy get-away.

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
