**WHY NOT BRITISH SETTLERS  
FOR THIS NORTH COUNTRY?**

Cable messages from London, England, as appearing in daily papers in Canada, suggests that the British Government is at present working on an ambitious scheme to substitute the settlement of Britain's surplus population overseas for the payment of doles to maintain the unemployed in the Old Land. Britain, it appears, is prepared to spend three million dollars yearly on the proposed plan of Empire settlement.

The despatch states that as applied to Canada, the plan calls for the migration of fifty thousand families in five years, a total of 400,000 persons. They would be settled in communities, not colonies, to be provided by a survey of the West into farms of 213 acres, instead of as at present, 160 and 320 acres. Two hundred acres would be cultivated, ten would be available for buildings and barns, and three would be the farmer's contribution to the communal village comprising cheese and butter factories, elevator, etc., and also a house in which he would live till he desired to live on his own farm, whence the house could be easily transported on rollers.

According to the plan as outlined now, the farmer would find a hundred acres broken and be provided with eight milk cows, four horses, eight hogs and thirty hens. Expert supervision would be provided by the Dominion Government and school facilities by the Province. It is estimated that it would cost \$7,500, to put each family on a farm of this kind. The proposal is that the British Government should advance this and give the farmer free passage with his family. The loan would be repaid by the farmer in 25 years, the Canadian Government guaranteeing only to collect such repayment.

To make the plan practical and of the highest value it is intended to establish in Britain training centres where prospective farmers may be taught how to handle horses and ploughs and milk cows, and the other rudiments of farming knowledge. Expert supervision on their farms in Canada would add to the chances of the settlers for making a success on the land.

It will be noted that the plan appears to be confined now to the West. Why not have it apply also to this North Land? Would it not be well worth while for the Ontario Government to give the question the most sympathetic consideration? The more of the right sort of British settlers that may be secured for this North Land the better.

It is interesting to note that many months ago Dr. Corliss, of Sudbury, outlined a plan for combining the unemployed doles of Britain and the immigration costs of Canada with a view to economically settling Canada and at the same time relieving Britain of its surplus population. The British Press representatives who visited Timmins some time ago were urged to consider and advocate the plan of Dr. Corliss. The British Press men apparently had a grasp of the situation not only in Britain, but also in Canada and were generally convinced that a plan was possible that would benefit alike Canada and the Old Land. In any event, British statesmanship has taken the question up in the usual thorough British way, and there is reason to hope that the plan outlined will do much to relieve the unemployed situation in Britain and also solve one of Canada's problems by making possible the settlement and development of the Dominion. In the plan there would seem to be a place for the North Land, and this fact should be kept in mind.

THURSDAY BIG SUCCESS.**

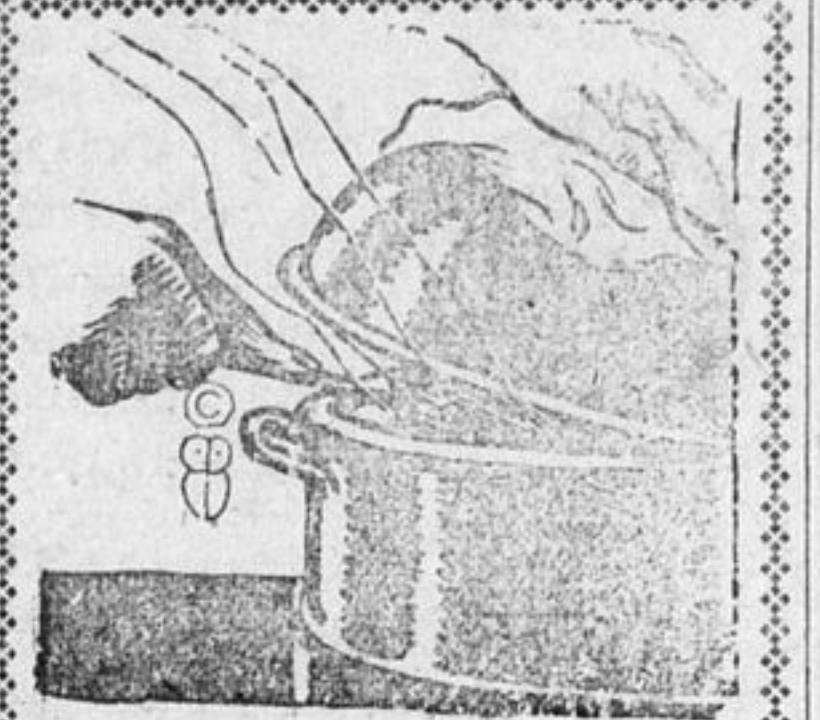

**POLITICAL SITUATION  
CONTINUES IN CONFUSION**

Mr. Ernest Laporte Taking Premier King's Place. House Meets December 10.

The political situation in the Dominion at present is about as odd as ever in Canada's history. Parliament has been called to meet Dec. 10th. Premier King not heeding the fact that he is leading a minority party. The Premier does not intend to secure a seat for himself before the House meet. Instead he has turned over the leadership in the House to Hon. Ernest Laporte. Hon. Mr. King will watch proceedings in parliament from the "distinguished visitors' gallery." The Progressives have signified their desire not to embarrass Mr. King at this time. The present standing of the parties is: Conservatives, 117 seats; Liberals, 100; 1 vacant; 1 in doubt; Progressives, Labour and Independent, 26.
