TOWN LEAGUE HOCKEY SUGGESTED FOR BOYS.

There is a famous saying to the effect that the battle of Waterloo was won on the playing fields of Eton. Certain it is, that clean amateur sport in youth equips men to play the game of life with better grace and to take their part in the world with greater advantage to their fellows.

Youth is the special time for sport and games and boys especially should be encouraged in clean sports. For this reason, it is suggested that steps be taken to have a town hockey league for the boys. Thought should be taken of the future of Canada's national winter game, and without the interest and success of the boys at the sport, the future can hold little promise.

OPPOSING PLAN TO DIVERT WATERS IN NORTH LAND

Every Man Should Oppose The Scheme, Says, Broke Hustler.

The Broke Hustler this week says: The question of diverting the waters of the Nogoki and the Albany rivers southward to form a sixth great lake, flowing into Lake Superior, thence through the St. Lawrence, but more particularly through the Chicago Drainage Canal, has cropped up again, this time with greater force behind it.

Questions were asked also which brought out that Mr. Campbell did not think that Chicago could be prevented from taking the water they are now doing and perhaps more in the future, and the question was asked—"Why rob Ontario to supply Chicago?"

Mr. Campbell, also in outlining his scheme, made the remark that after this huge lake had been formed and the water drained south to give water power development, it would first touch Ontario at a point which he marked on the map as a short distance from Lake Superior. In other words, Ontario, to Mr. Campbell, is a few miles north of Lake Superior. To him and the other backers of this project, New Ontario is not Ontario at all, but is practically a wilderness about which they need not worry.

If, Chicago, taking ten thousand cubic feet per second has reduced the great lakes to such a level as to threaten ruin to Old Ontario, what would happen to New Ontario, which is four times as great as Old Ontario, if double or triple that amount of water were taken from the Northern watersheds.

Another question, what would the people of New Ontario be doing while Mr. Campbell and his associates were taking the water of Northern Ontario and handing it over, some to Chicago and some to the Great Lakes.

If a vessel is leaking, the solution is not to pour in more water, but to plug the leak.

B. J. McLean, Michigan Director of the National Rivers and Harbour Congress of Detroit, says:—

"If Chicago is permitted to divert the lake waters to another water shed, why not everybody to the same extent on both sides of the International line, until absolute anarchy prevails and the Great Lakes cease to function as a navigation system. The United States and Canada must insist that waters flowing into the Great Lakes shall follow their natural channels."

The question is so important that every man in Ontario should study it
