ISLAND FALLS POWER AT IROQUOIS FALLS NOW

The two big 25 cycle generators at Island Falls were first turned over on November 6th, and on November 9th, juice was supplied for lighting the plant and camps.

The first electric boiler is expected to be in commission on or about Dec. 1st, at Island Falls. The wiring is complete and as soon as the piping is done for the boiler the juice can be turned on and steam generated.

The boiler consists of three iron tanks with an electrode in each and the tanks connected and grounded.

There will be two units of this style and the third unit will be a large single chamber boiler of the C. G. E. type.
