CULTIVATE COURTESY FOR THE SAKE OF EVERYBODY

A gentleman who attended a recent public dance in town has commented on the apparent lack of courtesy evidenced too generally to-day. There was a large attendance at the event and not sufficient seating accommodation for all. Young men crowded into the chairs and left older men and the ladies to stand. It tempted the thoughtful gentleman to regret older days when courtesy and chivalry were more generally observed. He did not make the mistake of thinking the conditions peculiar to Timmings or the North. Regrettably, it must be said, it is the way of the world to-day. And, even from a selfish standpoint, it is a poor way. Courtesy is simply the expression of kindness and consideration for others. It oils the machinery of this cranky world. Without courtesy social and public life can scarcely be possible.

Efficiency experts prate about "courtesy in business." That is something that will look after itself. But discourtesy in social and public life is another thing. What can a man do when a discourteous motorist runs him down without apology, except get a car of his own? When the moving picture is spoiled by the simpton reading the titles aloud, what is the remedy further than to repeat the words louder? When the concert is disturbed by the couple who prefer mushy love to soft music, what can be done apart from shrieking "applause?" Discourtesy would breed, indeed is breeding—confusion and disorder that eventually would troy the pleasure of all.

The remedy lies in a little thoughtfulness. In any sort of community life courtesy is imperative. Emphasis must be placed on good sportsmanship. Good fellows,—men or women, boys or girls,—always give the other fellow a fair chance. In the game of life, all should religiously observe the rules of good sport. It is the only way that life can be lived with any satisfaction or comfort.

IT IS WELL TO BE CHARITABLE BUT FOOLISH TO BE FISH.

Every year there is a procession of beggars coming to Timmings from the four quarters of the earth. The blind, the halt, the lame, the crippled, the diseased, the crooked, and the lazy,—especially the crooked and the lazy,—rush here for alms. Men and women come here from places two hundred, five hundred, a thousand and even two and three thousand miles away, to tell their tales of woe and take toll from the kind-hearted. The police prevent these visitors from straight begging, but their excuses of selling porous plasters or German-made lead pencils are but the thinnest disguises for common begging. It is safe to say that ninety per cent. of these beggars are unworthy. The very fact of them being able to travel up through this sparsely-settled country to this young city is proof generally that they have been attracted here by reports that gold camps are great spawning beds for gold fish. This week no less than three individuals were here soliciting help from the good people of this town. One of them admitted coming from Newfoundland. Is there no charity in Newfoundland? Another had his home in Quebec. Is there no kindly help in Quebec? Toronto appears to send out the beggars in droves. Has Toronto no heart? It appears to be unthinkable that all the towns and cities of the continent should neglect their worthy unfortunates and leave them to wander the face of the earth, with no hope but the kindness of Timmings. Possibly, southern and eastern places do not realize how needy their beggars are as they see them go by in their automobiles.

From Nov. 15th, 1924, to Nov. 15th, 1925, the Town of Timmings as a municipality expended over \$20,000.00 for charity and relief. This was in addition to the amount collected by the travelling beggars. It proves that this town is not lacking in charity and kindness. However, as Tennyson once wrote:—"Kind hearts are more than coronets, and common sense than being a fish."

It is well to be charitable, but it is neither sensible nor fair for Timmings to be an easy mark for the mean and the miserably. The Town of Timmings has attacked the local charity problem by the organization of the Associated Charities of Timmings. Already the good work of this organization is evident. It dispenses relief without overlapping. It is an effective channel for relief without waste. The other problem of the travelling beggar must be solved by the people themselves. The method of solution is very simple. Just send all the beggars to the Associated Charities office at the Town Hall. If they are worthy they will be attended to. Any charity you wish to give, give only through the Associated Charities.

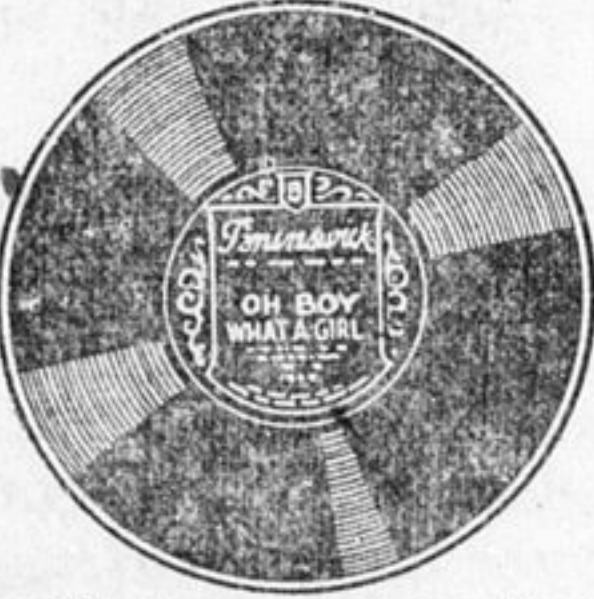
