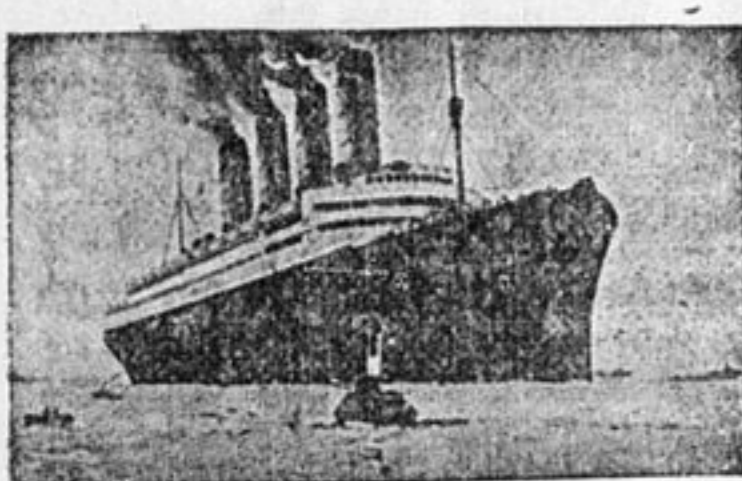

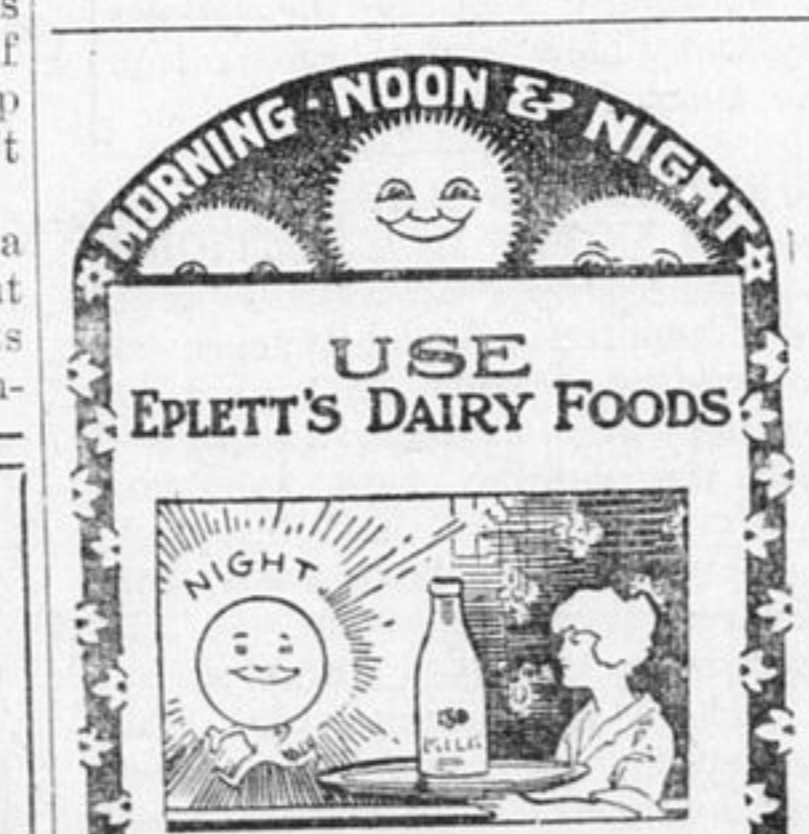
Messrs. Alan and Ed. Hawkins left for Orillia on Wednesday morning, having received the sad news of the death of their father.
