TIMMINS SHOULD GET MORE OF GOLD ROYALTY

In their election addresses, two or the candidates for the Mayoralty this year make reference to the handicap under which (Timmins labours through the out-of-date apportionment of the gold royalty. Under the law, as it has been for years, the municipality is supposed to receive one half of the royalty, but no matter how much the half may amount to, the town is not allowed more than \$35,000.00 in any one year. At he time the provision was made, the total royalty did not exceed \$35,000.00, so there was no general objection to the limit placed. The Advance, however, at the time objected to the imposing of the \$35,000.00 limit, believing that with the development of mining here the provision would soon prove burdensome. It is only fair to say that at the time the \$35,000.00 limit was imposed, Dr. McInnis was one of those strongly opposing it.

Dr. McInnis and Mr. Gauthier both suggest that next year they will make a determined effort to secure an increase in the gold royalty, so far as Timmins is concerned Mr. Brazeau no doubt will also favour this fair play to the municipality. 
