TIMMINS SHOULD GET MORE OF GOLD ROYALTY.

In their election addresses, two of the candidates for the Mayoralty this year make reference to the handicap under which Timmins labours through the out-of-date apportionment of the gold royalty. Under the law, as it has been for years, the municipality is supposed to receive one half of the royalty, but no matter how much the half may amount to, the town is not allowed more than \$35,000.00 in any one year.

At election time in several years past, The Advance has emphasized the fact that the cure for high taxation for Timmins was simply an increase in the royalty received. The growth of the town forces expenditures for health, safety and comfort. The growth of the mining industry is what has made the growth of the town.

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any moment through the normal growth of the mining industry, and so the Government should surely be content with a straight half of the royalty paid by the mines each year, the other half to go to the municipality. Dr. McInnis has been urging this upon the Government during the past year or two, and there is reason to believe that in the coming year the Government will see the fairness of the request and remove the handicap of the \$35,000.00 limit.

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N.O.H.A. EXECUTIVE MAKE PLANS FOR SR. SERIES

Draft Rules at Meeting After Annual Meeting Last Week.

After the annual meeting of the N.O.H.A. last Saturday there was a meeting of the Executive. The North Bay Nugget gives the following report of this latter meeting:

"Discussion of the proposed plans for the elimination series of the senior N. O. H. A. cup, among town league teams of the North, formed the principal business transacted at an executive meeting that followed the annual meeting of the N. O. H. A. on Saturday. It was decided that the league might pick a team to represent it in the elimination series and, while the league games and picking of the team will be under the direction of the various leagues, the final series will be taken care of by the N. O. H. A. Amateur cards and N.O.H.A. certificates for all players taking part in the elimination series must be submitted to the N. O. H. A. before February 1st and the players must all be eligible under the residence rule. Home and home games will be followed in the elimination series."

"The following were granted transfers from the N. O. H. A. to the O. H. A.: Lawrence Aurie, Sudbury to Galt; Clarence Boucher, Iroquois Falls to Galt; Joseph LeClere, Iroquois Falls to Galt; Gordon Dewar, Iroquois Falls to Niagara Falls; William Brady, Sudbury to Owen Sound; Harvey Lott, North Bay to Oshawa; Arthur Corbeau, North Bay to Windsor, and A. A. MacDonell, Sudbury to Port Arthur."

"The following were appointed convenors of various groups:— G. W. Turk, northern junior and senior sections, R. B. Grills, central section; C. O. Baker, southern junior, and W. A. Thompson, southern senior. "The convenors will prepare schedules for their groups, which will be passed upon at the meeting on December 12th. Certificates will also be considered at this meeting."

ROUYN RAILWAY NOW MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

A despatch, dated Cochrane, Dec. 1st, has appeared in the daily papers as follows:—"All rumors to the effect that there is a likelihood of construction work being halted on the new Rouyn Mines Railway, were put at rest on Saturday by the discovery that there has been made in cutting out and grading the line and it will not be many months before a start will be made in laying the steel. Even should political developments occur that would prevent the Canadian National's participation in the operation of the line, it is now definitely known that the railway will be built and operated by the Province of Quebec. An official announcement states that to date four miles of the Rouyn Mines Railway is now graded from O'Brien twenty miles of the right of way have been cut out and cleared and it is hoped to establish telephone communication with Rouyn City within ten days."

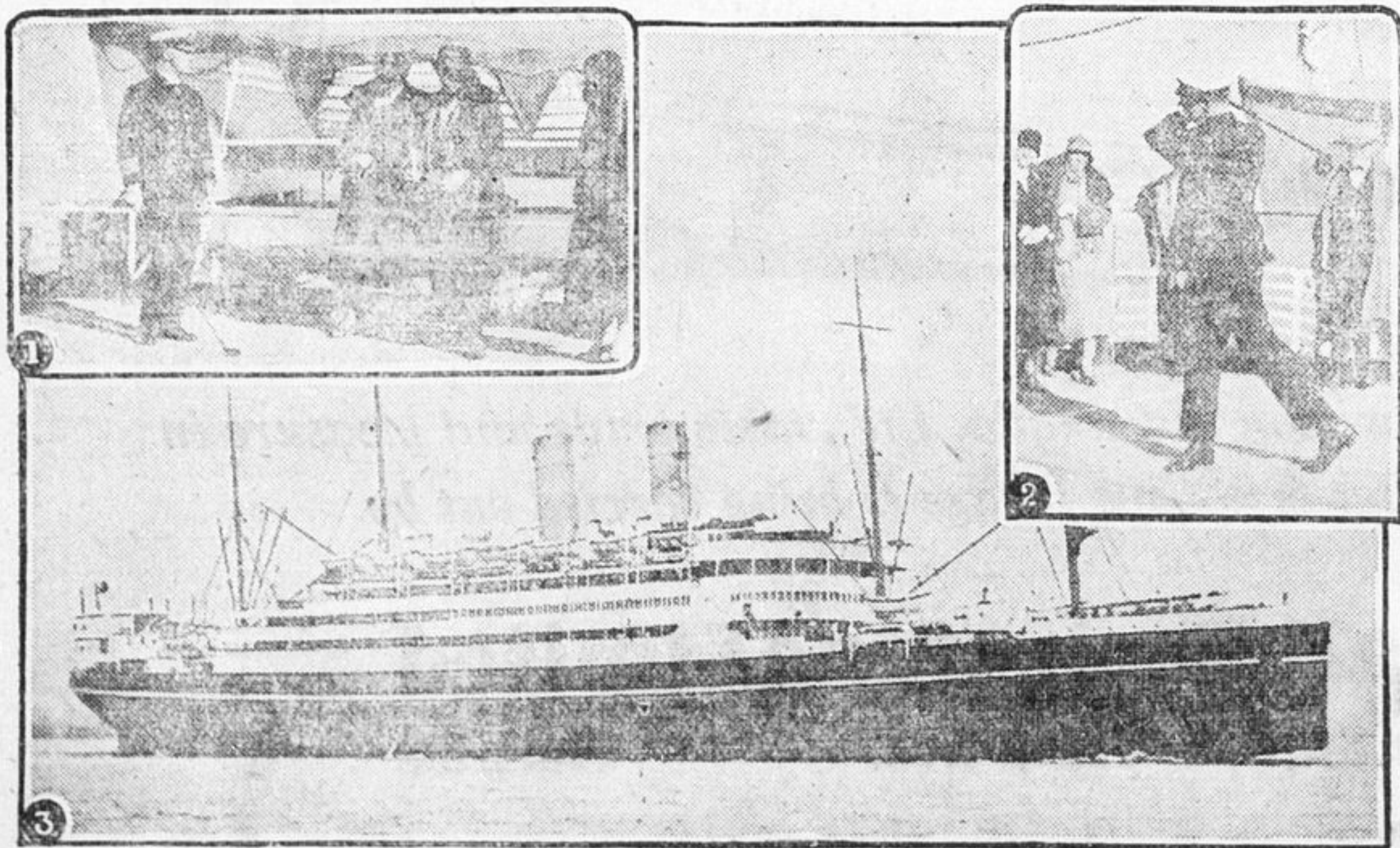

Teeing off for a "Round-the-World" Trip

Here you see Commander R. G. (Jock) Latta, of the S.S. Empress of Scotland, flag-ship of the Canadian Pacific fleet, just before and in action as a member of the "Round-the-World Golf Club", teeing off from the deck of his ship and splitting the fairway far into the ocean with the first ball of the tournament. The idea of the club was first started by I. O. Upham, of the San Francisco Golf Club, who on a \$50 bet went ahead with the notion of teeing on foreign golf links across the world, playing one hole on every course with the same ball. He had all his bets on golf, leaving his ball on a Chinese

links and hiring twelve men to search for it, to finding the Copenhagen Golf Club, Denmark, occupied by the whole Danish army. Before returning to San Francisco he had played on 55 courses. Captain Latta is one of the latest members of the Club and a number of fellow members will sail on the Empress of Scotland on December 3rd from New York on the fifth yearly cruise of the globe undertaken by C.P.R. Vessels. The coming trip will cover 27,320 miles, nineteen countries, every kind of climate, race and tongue, and will return to New York April 10, 1926 from a trip occupying 129 days.
