CO-OPERATE FOR THE ADVANTAGE OF TIMMINS.

The electors of the Town of Timmins have shown very praiseworthy characteristics in regard to the recent municipal election. They have shown that they appreciate and uphold good services given in the past and that they are ready to stand by good men who stand by the town.

But there is one more matter in which the people may show the best qualities of citizenship, and that is in giving the limit of support to the Council elected. Appreciation one day a year—Election Day—is a splendid thing, but there is a something better, co-operation all the year round with the elected authorities for the advantage of the town.

Among the questions to be taken up by next year's Council will be the matter of securing a larger share for the Town of the gold royalty. For this, a united people, wholeheartedly backing up the Mayor and Council and other authorities, can practically assure success to the efforts to secure a fair return in this matter for the Town.

There are other questions where co-operation will prove equally advantageous for all concerned. The gold royalty is mentioned simply as an example. The Town of Timmins has shown appreciation for public services given. The Town of Timmins, by co-operation and good-humoured support of its own choice of representatives, can further advance and benefit the general interests of the Town and assure its more certain progress and prosperity.

DEATH OF POPULAR OLD-TIMER THIS WEEK

Geo. Johnson Passed Away at Dome Hospital from Pneumonia, After Brief Illness.

Wide circles of friends in the Porcupine Camp will learn with the deepest regret of the death at the Dome Hospital on Tuesday of Mr. Geo. Johnson, M.E., Captain of the Ankerite Mine. Some eight or nine days previously Mr. Johnson was taken ill with pneumonia, and transferred to the Dome Hospital. There he was given every possible attention and care, but quietly passed away on Tuesday evening.

The late George Johnson was 42 years of age at the time of death, and his home was in Kalamazoo, Michigan. He had spent fifteen or more years in this North Country, residing both in Cobalt and the Porcupine, and having hosts of friends wherever known. For the past year and a half he had been Captain of the Ankerite. At various times in the past he had held other responsible positions in this Camp and at Cobalt. He was unmarried. His brother, Mr. Chas. Johnson, accompanied the remains on Wednesday morning to Kalamazoo, Mich., where interment will be made at his old home town. The late Mr. Johnson was a valued member of Cobalt A. F. & A. M., and was popular here in Masonic circles.

LARGEST RECENT LIQUOR RAID IN COBALT TUESDAY

Nine Women and One Man Arrested at Silver Town This Week.

A despatch this week from Cobalt says that town and Provincial officers early Wednesday arrested nine women and one man, all on charges of selling liquor, in a raid that was the largest here in some years. Two liquor operatives have been at work in town for a number of weeks and to-day's proceedings were the outcome of their activities. In addition Mike Conta, of the Atlantic Welcome Club, was picked up on a charge of taking a rake-off at card playing in that institution. Eight of the accused have been released on bail to appear before the magistrate on Saturday, but Conta and two of the women are held by the police.
