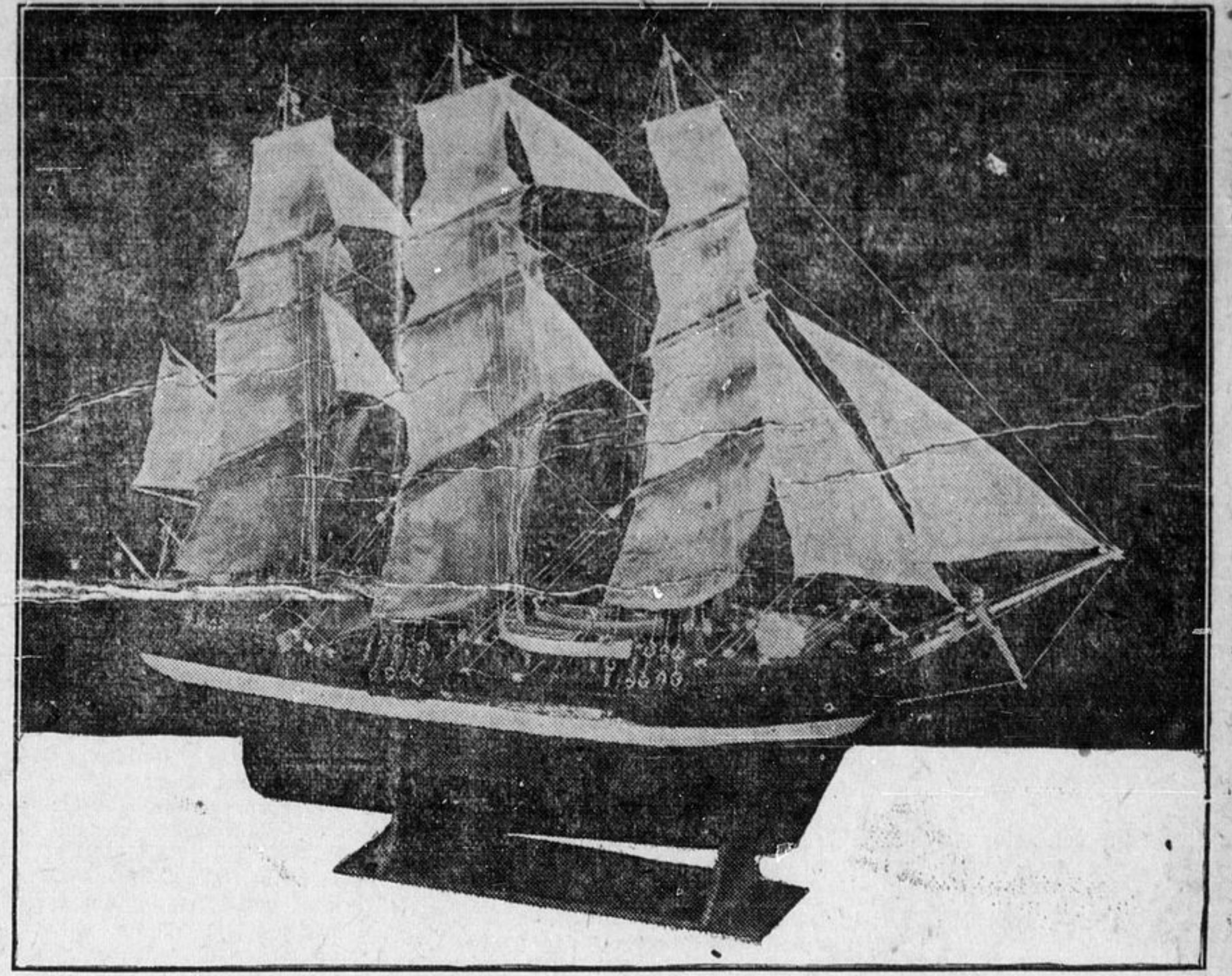

### QUEER IDEAS ABOUT THE LOCATION OF THE NORTH

There is an old story about a little boy who was asked where Canada was located. "Oh, way down somewhere in Quebec," he replied. Some of the people in the South apparently have just as odd ideas as to the location of this North Land. Last week a writer in the Mail and Empire had a breezy letter about a trip through "Northern Ontario." The trip was a sort of gypsy excursion through the "North," but the furthest "North" the trip seemed to extend was Eugenia Falls, a few miles from Owen Sound. The "gypsies" could have travelled north for another 700 or 800 miles without passing Northern Ontario or walking into the Northern sea. Because Owen Sound is north of Toronto does not make it Northern Ontario any more than Toronto is Northern Ontario because it is north of Niagara Falls.

### FINDING OF JUDICIAL ENQUIRY IN BUCKE TP.

The judicial enquiry into the affairs of Bucke Township resulted in the issuing of a lengthy judgment in the matter by His Honour Judge Hartman. The enquiry was into a "supposed malfeasance or breach of trust or other misconduct" in the affairs of Bucke Township during the years 1922-1925 inclusive. A summary of the report is given in despatches as follows:—

According to Judge Hartman the former clerk and treasurer, Henry Ellis Gridley received \$2,800 illegally from the township in the last two months of 1924 and has misappropriated or failed to account for an additional \$1,760.39 received by him during his term of employment with the municipality. The larger sum relates to an application made by Gridley for a loan from the local Housing Commission, and which it was alleged he had obtained without authority.

His Honour also finds that Robert Howard, ex-reeve of the township, who counter-signed the two cheques paid to Gridley from the Housing Commission account, and advanced by the province of Ontario, had done this contrary to the statutes of Ontario and to express resolutions of the Bucke Housing Commission, "and in doing so enabled the said Gridley to unlawfully obtain the amounts of the said two cheques."

It is also stated that the conditions of the bond entered into between the township and the Ocean Accident and Guarantee Corporation has not been complied with by the municipality and for this reason the company had refused to make good Gridley's deficit. The bond was for \$2,000, covering the former clerk and treasurer, and the application was signed by Burt Normandy, then reeve of the township.

So far as is generally known the whereabouts of the former Township Clerk, Gridley, is unknown at present.

Teek Township has a by-law similar to the one in force in Timmins for the past two or three years, whereby delinquent tax-payers were deprived of their votes. Teek Council recently repealed the by-law, finding that while it was fair enough as regards property owners it worked a hardship on tenants who paid their rentals promptly but whose landlords were not as careful in paying the taxes.
