Prize Winners at the Recent Poultry and Pet Stock Show

Good Showing of Prize Birds. Unusually Large Exhibit of High-Class Thoroughbred Dogs, at the Recent Third Annual Show of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Association.

At the recent third annual Show of the Porcupine Poultry and Pet Stock Show there was a good showing of poultry, and an unusually fine exhibit of prize dogs.

In the poultry classes, there were 317 entries.

In the dog classes, there were over 50 entries.

Mr. Wm. Cadman of London, Ont., was the judge of poultry, and his findings were generally satisfactory. This is the third year that Mr. Cadman has been judge here.

Mr. Sullivan also had the Champion coloured male and female Barred Rocks in the Show. The Best Shaped male and female went to Roy Black.

FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS' WORTH OF LIQUOR SEIZED

Provincial Officer Here Seizes Shipments With Three Different Addresses. Total of 160 Gallons Seized.

Saturday evening last Provincial Officer H. O. Finger made a rather noteworthy seizure of liquor at the T. & N. O. Ry. here. Three differently addressed shipments were taken in charge by the officer. One shipment had ten five-gallon cans of alcohol, a second contained twelve five-gallon cans, and the third shipment was a ten can one, each can holding five gallons. The liquor was conveyed to the Timmins police station where it was held for the Magistrate's consideration and decision this week. One of the parties to whom the liquor was addressed is unknown here and can not be located. The other two denied all knowledge of the shipments. The total amount of liquor in the three shipments would be 160 gallons and at the moderate rate of \$25.00 per gallon the full value of the shipments would easily be \$4,000.00.

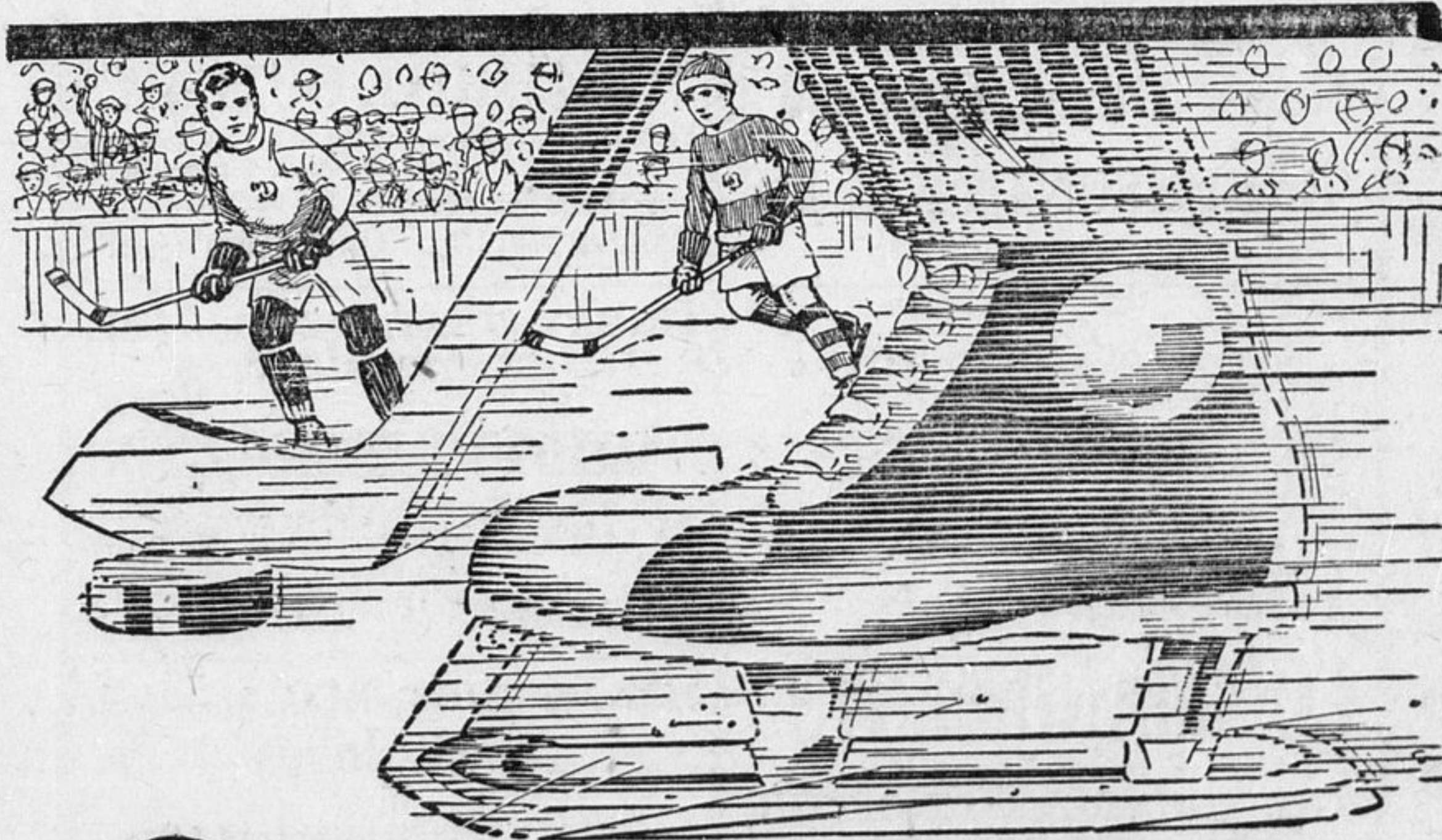
