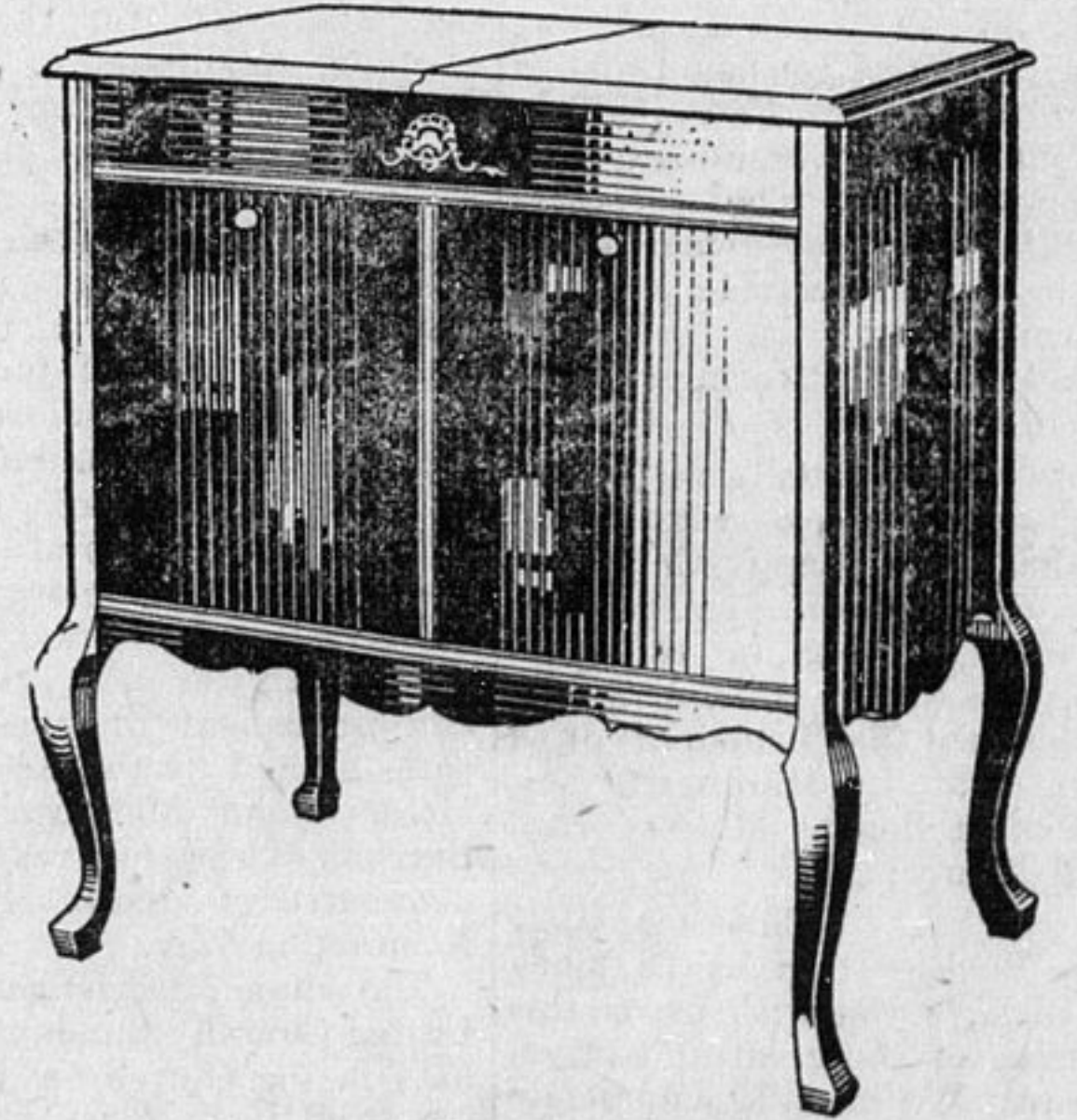
# HERE IS ANOTHER TO ADD TO LIST OF "WOLF" STORIES

This paragraph is from the last issue of The Northern News of Cobalt:—

"O. Fleury, Ville Marie, well known trapper, according to reports widely current in South Lorrain and points on Lake Temiskaming, was killed and eaten by wolves last Friday. What are alleged to be authentic particulars of the man's fate reached The Northern News from two points, but through the medium of the mining recorder, Ville Marie, it was learned that his family have no word of a tragedy, and do not believe one occurred, as it is thought his two sons who were with him at the time would have returned home with the news. Provincial police headquarters here are without information, and Inspector Moore has heard of no tragedy of this nature. The locality where the supposed affair took place is eight miles below the Matabichoua power plant, south of the mouth of the Montreal River. The stories heard, which corroborate one another in practically every detail, state the trapper and one son became separated in the bush. The son fired his rifle to attract the older man's attention. Getting no response he is said to have organized a search party from Arnott's camp, on the Kipawa River on the Quebec side of Lake Temiskaming. This party is declared to have found bones, cap and boots, and according to one story, a rifle near the remains, which were picked clean. A son and daughter, at Ville Marie tell The News that they do not believe there can be anything in the report else word would have come to them. Wolves are plentiful in the sector this year, but so also are red deer, their chief food, and bushmen cannot believe they would attack a man, especially an armed man."

If it were not the joyous Christmas season of peace and goodwill, The Advance would suggest that the author of this latest wolf yarn is a falsifier, a deviator from the truth, a prevaricator, in fact, a twister of the truth. But as it is Christmas, then even to this man a Merry Christmas, though many will think he does not deserve it.
