Game Played Under Protest Won by Iroquois Falls 5-2

Big Crowd from Timmins Accompanied Local Lads to the Falls. It was a Good Game. Referee from Liskeard Wonderful Improvement Over Referee From Falls. Timmins Missed Two Men Suspended, but All the Team Played Well.

THE GOOD AND THE BAD IN THE HOCKEY SITUATION.

As in everything else in this ugly and beautiful world, there appears to be a mixture of the pleasant and the undesirable in the present hockey situation in this district.

It is regrettable that Iroquois Falls with its winning team and everything in its favour should appear to be anxious to take advantage of every technicality to make assurance doubly sure of winning the trophy, rather than considering the ideal of good sport.

There is the sincerest regret and the deepest shame in Timmins because of the occurrence. But it is pleasant to know that not a single player or anyone officially connected with hockey participated in the unfortunate misdemeanor.

It is a matter for regret that some of the blows struck and the kicks that reached the fallen referee came from Iroquois Falls people who hoped to injure others. But it is a compensation to good sportsmanship to know that many Iroquois Falls people are generous in approval of the good sportsmanship and good citizenship of men like Walter Ecclestone and others, who deliberately accepted blows meant for the referee and received kicks that were intended to injure the official who had gone down so hard.

It is a splendid thing to know that business and professional men believe that success in sport is more concerned with playing the game with courage and wholeheartedness, rather than with winning or losing matches. The banquet to the hockey lads by the Kiwanis is one of the encouraging incidents in the untoward situation.

This is a sad world, a hard world, a happy world and a pleasant world—this North Land—and here as throughout the globe the good and the pleasant seem to far outweigh the unworthy and the miserable.

GOVERNMENT'S INTEREST IN NORTH AND EDUCATION.

The need for provision for the education of children in the families of settlers and others in the sparsely-settled sections of the North Land has been earnestly urged upon the consideration of the Government. It is pleasing to note that the Government has given most careful consideration, and after due enquiry, has taken appropriate action. This pleasing result is largely due to the sympathetic attitude of Premier Ferguson, Minister of Education, who stands ready at all times to do anything to assist the North Land or the cause of education.

"Dear Sir—I beg to inform you that the Minister of Education has recently made special enquiry for the purpose of finding out the number of children of school age, in Ontario, situated in places so remote from a school, that for the greater part of the year they are unable to attend any school.

"In view of the fact that you seem to be situated at a considerable distance (more than three miles) from the nearest school and your children have not the opportunity of receiving an education such as is desirable, forms of application for Correspondence Courses are herewith enclosed which you are asked to fill in and return to me. These Courses will be offered free of charge to those families remote from schools, who wish to take advantage of them.

"When the information asked for on the forms of application is received it may be possible to send the applicants the first lessons in connection with the Correspondence Courses. The work given in these lessons is to be done by the children and returned to me. These lessons will be examined and new ones sent out. All books and paper required for the Courses will be furnished by the Department of Education."

Monday night for the fifth time this season Timmins lost out to Iroquois Falls in the Junior N.O.H.A. series. The match was at Iroquois Falls, and a crowd of around 250 went over from Timmins and the stations along the branch to cheer the Timmins boys along. The big turnout on the special train showed fine sportsmanship. It was a certain tip to the boys that, win or lose they will have support as long as they play their best as they have been doing.

On account of the action of the N. O.H.A. in suspending Greco and Couture without defence or investigation, the game was played under protest. However, a team was gotten together without the suspended players, and this team put up a good line of hockey. The Falls had no walk-over. Indeed, while it may be admitted that the Falls was the better team on the play—with speedier skating and better combination—it must also be admitted that the score did not indicate the play. Timmins missed two or three excellent chances to score, one muffed by Boyd being a particularly provoking one to let slip by. The third goal counted was a straight offside by three feet. The referee did not see it. Ouimet, of Liskeard, was a great improvement over Bousquet. He was fair and apparently counted them as he saw them. He did not consciously favour either side, but Timmins had no luck, suffering in penalties and in other ways from the breaks of the game.

But all the Timmins boys played well—gave all they had—so no one will object. Levine in goal stopped a lot of hard ones. The first two he let in were the kind that get by the best. Another of the goals was well-earned indeed, a dandy. Boyd and Ganton on defence put up a good game, thoughtful and steady. They each scored a goal for good measure. The forwards played well, and with their combination working well yet make the Falls sit up and take notice. The Falls must be afraid, or they wouldn't be so anxious as they appear to be to load the chances against Timmins. Lawrence, as usual was a hard, earnest and effective worker, tireless and steady. Charlebois did well, but did not get going in his best form. Teevins, Arundel and Monaghan played their parts with snap and judgment. The soft ice made the going hard, but it was a good game to watch.

For the Falls McIntyre and Lever were perhaps the stars of the evening with Mills in goal as a super-star. He stopped all kinds of them and his second name is Good Luck. And he's good enough not to need so much luck. Levine was rather badly hurt when a speedy shot went down behind his breastpad and causing a rupture, as was learned after the game. He made a quick recovery from the injury and carried his good work through to the end of the game. Teevins also was laid out during the game, being rather badly cut back of the ear. He had to be assisted off the

ice. When he returned he was penalized, though it is hard to figure why. Teevins was lying practically unconscious on the ice for a few seconds before the referee rang his bell, so the referee could not have seen anything to justify any penalty on Teevins.

Six minutes after the start McIntyre got a nice one by, duplicating the trick before another six minutes had passed. Timmins made desperate efforts to equalize but failed each time. One hard shot to lose occurred when a pass to Boyd left him a rare shot but his luck was out for that time.
