The Peace and Charm of the Forests in Every Season of the Year.

What a vast number of people in the busy cities long for the countryside and its charm? What a crowd of country people seek the bustle and the life of the city? The appreciation of the country given by the occasional visitor from the city is only equalled by the enthusiasm with which rural folks enjoy an occasional trip to the city. The fact seems to be that mankind is rather slow to appreciate the everyday surroundings. 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
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
