## Twenty-One Rinks in the Big Bonspiel Here Last Week

### VALUABLE GYPSUM FIND REPORTED IN FAR NORTH

Valuable gypsum deposits have been discovered in Northern Ontario 150 miles beyond Cochrane towards James Bay, Premier Ferguson announced Tuesday afternoon. He stated that large and important mining interest had approached in working the deposits. The assistance sought is an extension of the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway to the deposits which between the present end of steel and the Moose River. Several firms have expressed willingness to guarantee the Government certain returns under contract if the railway extension is made. The gypsum is said to be of superior quality. The Government is taking the matter of railway extension under consideration.

## GREAT VIOLINIST NOW VISITING NORTH LAND

Pietro Aria, Noted Italian Violinist, Spending Some Days in Timmins on Tour of the North.

Timmins has a distinguished visitor these days in the person of Mr. Pietro Aria, one of Italy's greatest present day violinists, who is stopping at the Empire Hotel, expecting to remain in Timmins for a few days before continuing his trip through Northern Ontario, a district Mr. Aria is visiting for the first time. He is much impressed with this country, finding it full of natural beauty and extraordinary opportunities. To his artistic temperament the vast spaces and the rugged grandeur make singular appeal. The gold camps also have been for Mr. Aria a great source of interest.

It was in April, 1915, while still a lad of 19, that young Aria was presented to the American public by O'Brien Butler, Ireland's great composer, who had then come from London, England, to introduce modern Irish music to this continent. Mr. Butler selected the gifted young Italian, Aria, to play his sonata at a concert in New York. Reviewing this first performance, a noted critic in The Musical Courier said:—"He plays with an abandon and assurance; his numbers, sufficient to test the ability of a more mature artist, were rendered artistically. With his open number he at once demonstrated that he possesses merit of a high order."

After this pronounced success, Mr. Aria gave many recitals, returning to Europe in 1919, leaving behind him a large following of admirers. Since then he has recently given a number of concerts in New York, where he was acclaimed with unanimous and increasing enthusiasm by public and press.

Mr. Aria is at present on a holiday visit to this North Land. He will leave shortly for Crystal Lake, Kirkland area, anxious to experience for a time the peace and quietness of camp life and to study and play his beloved violin untroubled by the distractions of city life and turmoil. It is hoped, however, that before leaving the North, Mr. Aria may be induced to play in Timmins so that the music-lovers of this district may have opportunity to hear this very talented violinist, generally acclaimed as one of the most outstanding artists of the present day.

Official figures give the loss from the fire at the Hunter block, Cobalt, as \$63,771.75, with \$32,871.75 insurance carried. 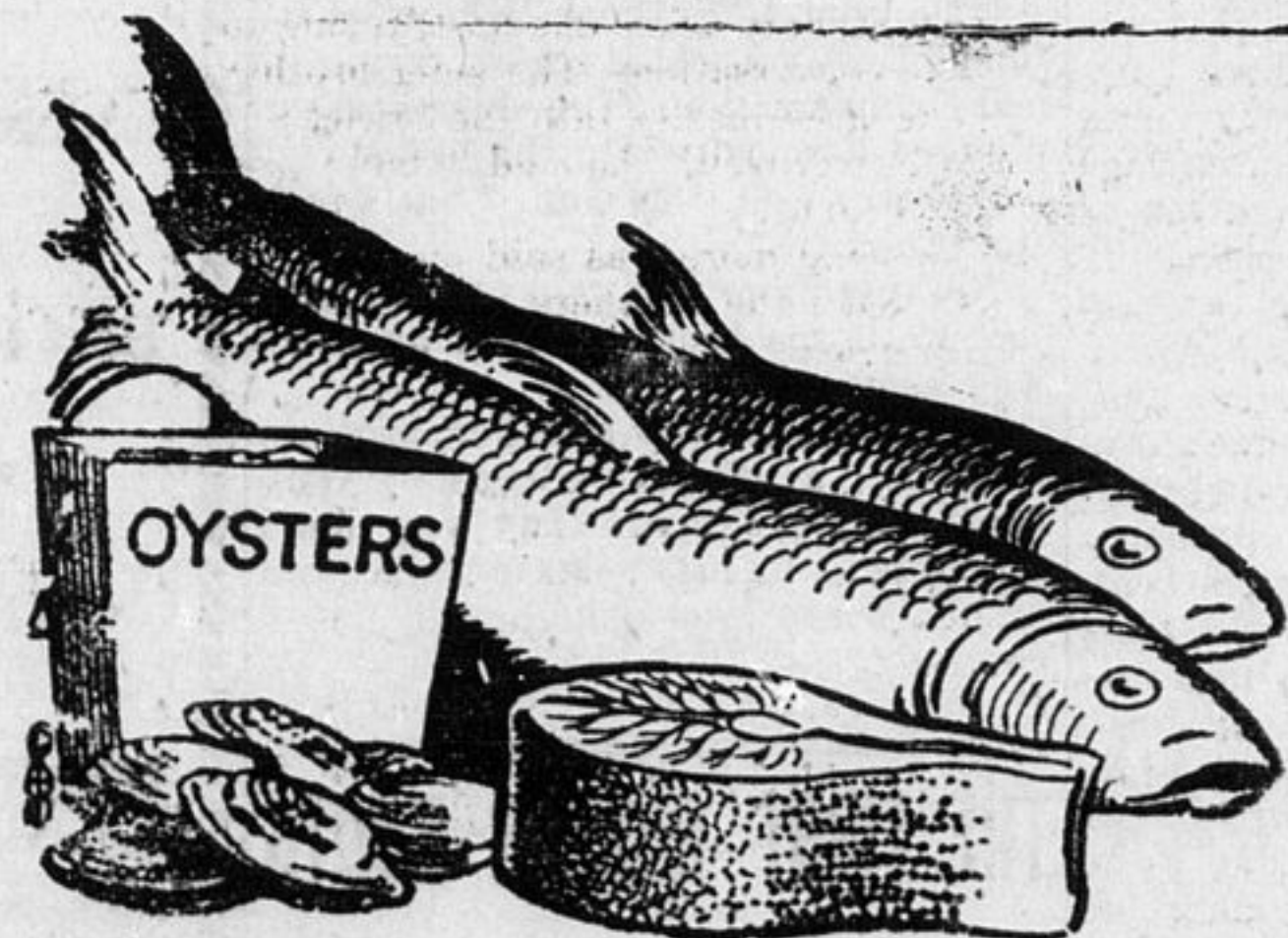
