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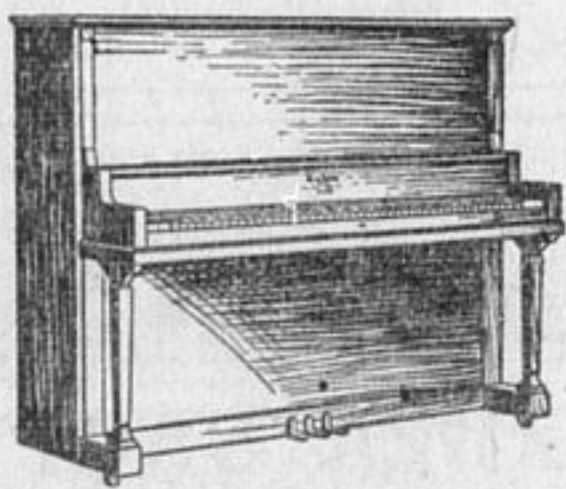
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Dog Race and Carnival Will Be Along Lines of Last Year

Main Race and Freight Races Practically the Same as
Last Year. Change of Course for Boys' Race. Carni-
val in Evening Again to be Made a Feature of the Event.

Monday afternoon there was a meeting of those interested in the Porcupine Dog Race and Carnival, the attendance and interest being greater than usual. Owing to there being a meeting of the Council at the Town Hall, the meeting was held in the Fire Hall, and in the absence of the President, Dr. McInnis, Fire Chief A. Borland, was voted to the chair.

After consideration, it was decided to run the event along the lines of last year. The main event—the Dog Race—will be over the same course as last year and the rules will be the same.

To avoid meeting of other dog teams at Schumacher, a slight change was made in the route for the Freight Race. On motion, it was decided that the course follow the back road to Schumacher, swinging into Third

Avenue by the school, going by the main road to Timmins. Messrs. Trofford and Bissonnette will see that arrows are put up to indicate this course. The rules and regulations of last year will otherwise obtain for the Freight Race this year.

After a discussion and consultation with several boy dog racers present, a change was made in the route of the Boy's Dog Race. On motion of Mr. Trofford, seconded by Mrs. J. A. McInnis, the route will be as follows:—Start at Imperial Bank, go down Pine street to Kirby, along Kirby to Maple, along Maple to Fourth, to the Imperial Bank again.

On motion of Mr. Trofford, seconded by Mrs. M. MacMillan, Friday, Feb. 12th, was decided upon as the date for this year's Dog Race and Carnival.

He explained that his dog team was tired out from the hard trip from Red Lake, and that he had left them about two miles out. He walked back that evening as a matter of course with food for his dogs, stayed the night with them, and brought them in safely in the morning.

Neh was one of the very first to make the trip in to Red Lake during the recent rush. When the reporter became eloquent about the romance and glorious adventure of the trip, Neh quietly remarked that the Indian guide he had was the finest of fellows and deserved all of any credit due. No doubt if the newspaperman asked Neh what took him into the Red Lake area in the first place he would reply: "Oh, I just went in there to see a man about a dog."

After getting new dog teams Neh started back again for Red Lake taking with him the equipment and supplies for the Mining Recording office to be established at the new camp.

CHIEF INSPECTOR OF MINES TO SPEAK HERE

Mr. T. F. Sutherland to Address Por-
cupine Mining Institute on Min-
ing in South Africa

Mr. T. F. Sutherland, Chief Inspector of Mines for Ontario, will address the Porcupine Branch of the Canadian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy on Friday, February 26th, at 8 p.m., in the Oddfellows' Hall, Timmins.

Mr. Sutherland spent three months in South Africa last year, at the direction of the Ontario Department of Mines. He was sent particularly to make a study of those conditions peculiar to deep mining and has returned with interesting information regarding the mines of South Africa.

His address to the local branch of the Mining Institute will deal with many of those problems which will present themselves as the miners of the Porcupine area reach to greater depths.

It is hoped to have some other and perhaps lighter entertainment. Luncheon will be served, for which a nominal charge will be made. A cordial invitation is extended to everyone, whether members of the local branch to attend.

LANCASHIRE FAMILIES PLAN TO COME TO CANADA

There will be special interest locally in despatches in The Mail & Empire recently from London, England. These despatches tell of plans for the settlement of Lancashire families in Canada. For this purpose the Lancashire Land Settlement Association has been founded by Sir John Pennefather, M.P. A considerable sum of money has been raised. It will be used to purchase farms and equipment in Canada and to install thereon Lancashire farmers and their families. The re-payment of the sums advanced will be collected at a rate of interest just high enough to cover losses from death and disease. There will be no attempt to establish exclusive Lan-

cashire colonies as this plan is not recommended by experience. Instead, the settlers will be located in the same area but separated more or less by old and experienced settlers on whom the newcomers can pattern themselves. In view of the large number of Lancashire people in this district, the matter is of special interest, and it is to be hoped that the North Land will receive its share of these good settlers. The general matter of a share for the North Land in the big rush of British immigration expected is well worthy the most careful consideration at this time.
