"The week ending February 27th was marked with a great excitement in the town of Cochrane. The howling of dogs during the day marked the opening of new syndicates formed or already formed.

"Never before could any prospector come to Cochrane and ask a merchant, do you want to join a syndicate?"

"But today it is different, things have changed, the merchant today is interested, he is a different man. 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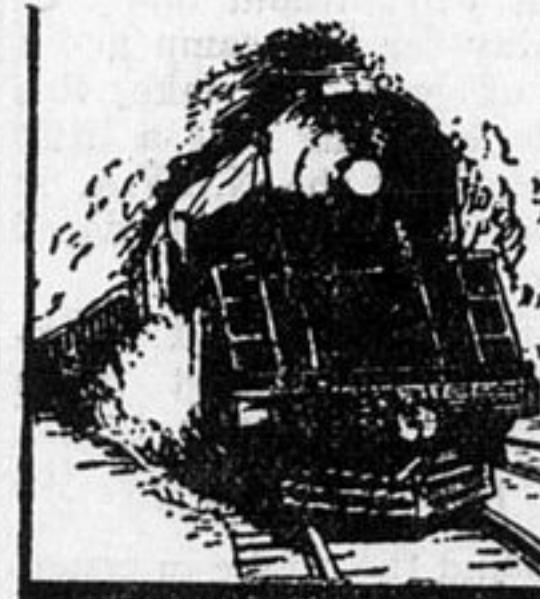
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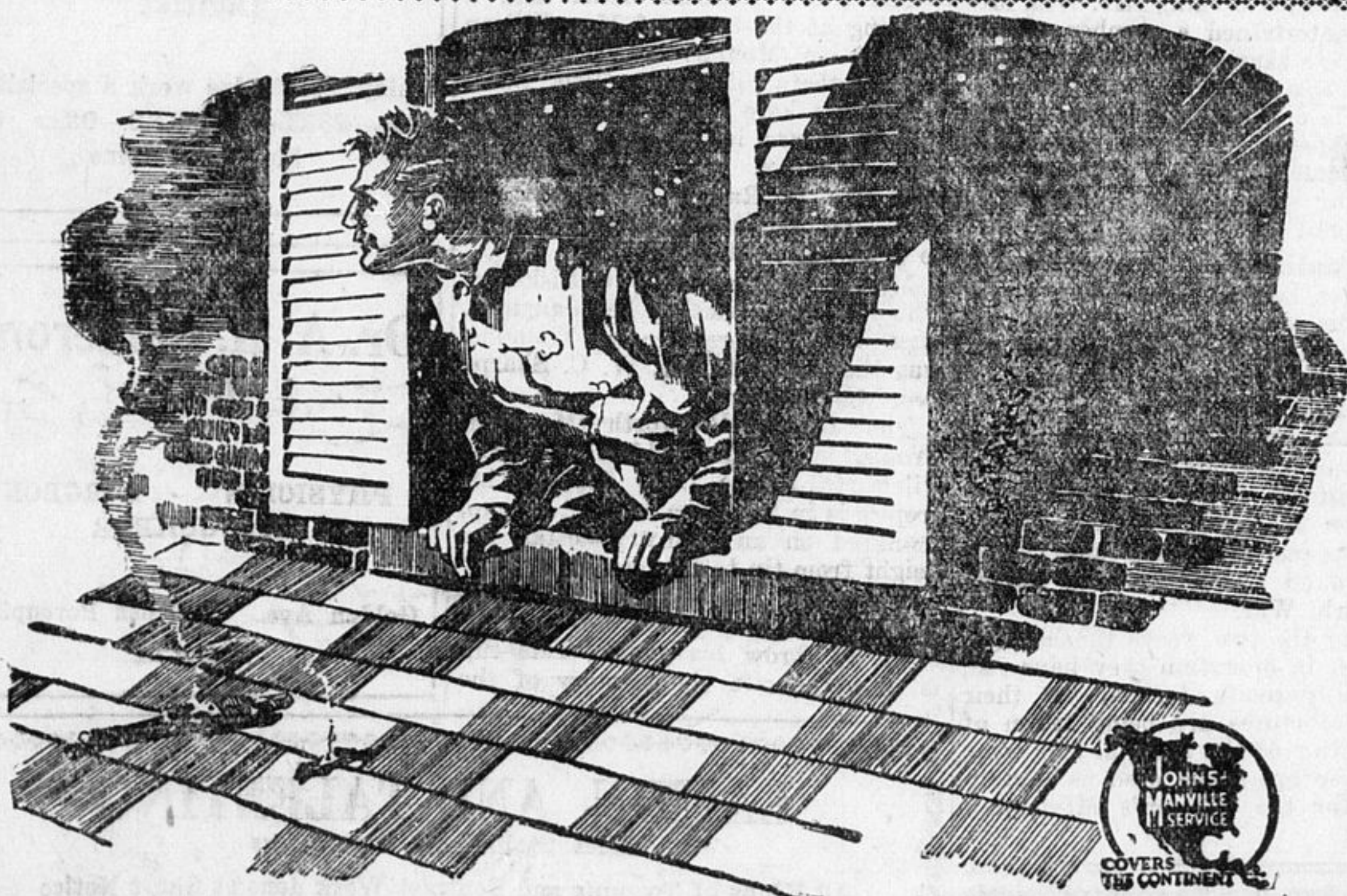
