EXPECTS \$35, 000, 000 PER YEAR FROM PORCUPINE

Mr. G. C. Bateman Takes the Role of Prophet in Address to Toronto Empire Club.

Much comment and great interest has been aroused by a recent address to the Empire Club of Toronto by Mr. G. C. Bateman, secretary of the Ontario Mining Association. Here are some of the striking paragraphs from Mr. Bateman's address:—
"From the earliest dawn of history down to our own times we can follow a trail of conquest and settlement arising from the desire for the precious metals. We find this in Australia in Africa, the western States, Alaska, and last but by no means least in Northern Ontario, but in these places only nature was conquered and this conquest led to the settlement of the land, to the establishment of big industries, and to a new supply of that yellow metal upon which the trade and commerce of the world is founded."

"This is what has taken place in Northern Ontario, which only a little over twenty years ago was practically an unknown wilderness. To-day it is the centre of a large and growing industry which during the past year, as also in 1924, was probably the greatest single factor in maintaining the prosperity of this Province. The value of the metallic production last year, all of which comes from the northern mines, was about \$60,000,000, an increase of \$10,000,000 over the preceding year. Including the money spent by non-producing as well as producing companies, approximately \$45,000,000 was paid out for wages, supplies and service, without taking into consideration the dividends paid, which also eventually find their way into the channels of trade."

"This sum, great as it is, and representing only the northern branch of the industry, is not simply one year's contribution to the business life of the country, it may be considered a permanent addition to our national wealth and one which will keep on increasing for many years to come."

"In Porcupine itself the producing area is being extended. Good results are being obtained east of Pearl Lake and south of the Dome two new mills are being built. Again essaying the role of prophet, I believe that in two years production in this camp will be at the rate of 34 to 35 millions a year, an increase of 40% over 1925 figures."

Pancoff Breaks Record for Time in Porcupine Dog Race

Made the Course on Friday Last in 1 Hour, 8 Minutes and 16 Seconds. Best Previous Record Was by W. Martin in 1923, the Time Being 1 Hour, 14 Minutes, 45 Seconds.

Several arguments started on Friday after the speed race as to the best time previously made over the present course, and also the record time for the former course which was about a mile longer. Some wagers were made as to the facts in the matter, and Friday and on Saturday The Advance was called upon to decide disputes regarding the records. The Advance of course, has kept the times and other particulars for each of the eleven races now held. On the old and longer course, the record is held by Geo. Cousineau's team—1 hour, 18 minutes, 35 seconds. For the present course the record until this year was held by Mr. W. Martin, whose team made the run in 1923 in 1 hour, 14 minutes and 45 seconds. On Friday Pancoff beat this record, making the course in 1 hour, 8 minutes, 16 seconds—an entirely new record and one that will be difficult to better. By odd coincidence the team now owned and driven by Pancoff was bought from Mr. W. Martin, who has won seven out of the eleven races held.

The course this year was in unusually good shape and the weather was about ideal. All the teams made better than the usual time.

For the interest of the many who wish to refer to previous times and records, the following summary of previous races and winners is given for the main dog race:—

Of this dozen entries, three were women drivers namely: Mrs. H. Darling, Mrs. Murley and Miss M. Martin.

March 10th, 1923—W. Martin, 1 hr., 14 min., 45 sec. 2nd, John Landers, 1 hr., 21 min., 20 sec. 3rd, Victor Bissonette, 1 hr., 28 min., 25 sec. 4th, Wm. Leclair, 1 hr., 28 min., 50 sec.—15 entries—the largest entry list yet.

March 8th, 1924—1st, W. Martin, 1 hr., 18 min., 55 sec. 2nd, St. Pierre, 1 hr., 19 min., 35 sec. 3rd, McLean (Cochrane), 1 hr., 20 min., 55 sec. 4th, Bridges, 1 hr., 24 min., 5 sec. 5th, MacMillan, 1 hr., 29 min., 10 sec.

There were twelve entries in this race, but only nine of these turned up to make the actual start—9 entries.

March 6th 1925—1st, Wilbord Poirier, 1 hr., 18 min., 5 sec. 2nd, W. Martin, 1 hr., 22 mins. 3rd, M. MacMillan, 1 hr., 27 min., 26 sec.—11 entries.

WORK NOW STARTED AT DELORO ASBESTOS MINE

New Company Providing Ample Finances and Property Expected to be Profitable Producer

After negotiations extending over some months the asbestos property in Deloro has been taken over by a new company known as the Porcupine Asbestos Corporation, with a capitalization of two million dollars and backing from strong Montreal financial interests. The officers of the new company are:—L. Cohen, president; Dr. Milton Hersey, vice-president; Samuel Brontman, secretary-treasurer; L. Z. Cohen, managing-director; and S. G. Eplett, Timmins to represent Northern Ontario shareholders on the board of directors. Stock in the syndicate is exchangeable for the company stock.

The new company has had experts investigate the property and the reports resulting are very favourable. It is believed that the Deloro asbestos is of specially good grade, with large bodies easily accessible. They look for the property to develop into a profitable producer at an early date.

Work is in progress now in installing machinery and make preparations for the active working of the property. It is expected that active operations will commence very shortly at the rate of about 200 tons of rock per day to be handled. The asbestos at the property is understood to be chiefly of grades No. 1 and No. 2, and so a particularly attractive proposition.

The property, which is about three miles from the Ankerite, was originally owned by Dr. Bowman, and A. T. Pommier and other Timmins men. Work was done on the property in 1923 and 1924 and some last year, but with the capital now available there is a general belief that the property will now develop into a big mine. With the Paymaster, Ankerite, and March Gold Mines getting in the list of producers this year, and the asbestos property going ahead, Deloro promises to step out in nice fashion in this year of grace, 1926.

Haileybury town council and the I.O.D.E. in the county town are co-operating with the Government to establish and maintain a Public Health Nurse in Haileybury.
