BOY CUT BY GLASS HAS OVER FIFTY STITCHES

Fifty-six stitches were required to close the wounds sustained by a Kirkland Lake boy in an unusual accident recently. The Kirkland Lake correspondent of The Northern News reports the incident as follows:—

"Ted Grierson, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Grierson, is in hospital as a result of a bad cut in the wrist which necessitated 56 stitches. He was in school last Friday and noticing what he thought was someone attempting to fasten a rope to his dog which was on the road, he asked and gained permission to go out and in rushing through the door, he pressed against a cracked glass in the door which gave way and the impact badly lacerated his wrist severing the artery, the nerve and a number of tendons.

SUGGEST USE OF KITES TO HELP CANOES ALONG

Here's what appears to be a brand new one! It is from The North Bay Nugget. The Nugget says:—

"All kinds of schemes are under consideration for alleviating the transportation difficulties that are likely to be encountered by individual prospectors who intend taking supplies to Red Lake when navigation opens. From the number of residents of Porcupine, prospectors and tender-foot alike, who have expressed their intention of hitting the trail this spring, it looks as though, such as Red Lake has been boomed already, it is merely enjoying a taste of what is to follow. A real old time mining stampede is in the offing.

"One of the most novel experiments under consideration was disclosed today by a group of prospectors. Their plan is to employ large kites, lines of which would be attached to the thwarts of the canoes. When flown at great heights it is claimed these kites would not only assist in propelling heavy laden canoes but would bear them up in such a manner that heavy loads could be transported with greater safety. One old prospector claims that he used this method effectively on previous trips. It is especially helpful when crossing large lakes."
