LACK OF ROADS HANDICAPS PROGRESS OF THE NORTH.

In the Ontario Legislature some days ago, the Premier, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, who is now acting as Minister of Lands and Forests until such time as a successor is chosen for Hon. Jas. Lyons, made a motion for the appropriation of five million dollars for development work in the North Land. None of the members of the House had the temerity to oppose the appropriation, but some of the members of the Opposition affected to believe that the money should be voted for specified works rather than in a lump sum as the urgent needs may demand.

The Opposition missed the point upon which fair criticism might have been made—the fact that the appropriation is inadequate in view of the pressing needs. The whole prosperity of the Province hinges on the progress of the North Land. During the past few years the development of the North Land has steadily assisted Ontario through trying times. The wealth of the North in minerals, in forests resources and in agricultural possibilities may easily mean the greatest measure of prosperity and progress for all Ontario.

In the discussion in the House an interesting statement was made by Hon. Jas. Lyons. "The North won't stand much longer for the expenditure of eighty or ninety millions on roads in Southern Ontario, while they are not getting a proportionate expenditure," said Mr. Lyons. "We in the North are as much entitled to the expenditure as the old part of the province."

Hon. Mr. Lyons has suffered what may be termed the penalty of public service—he had endured misrepresentation and abuse; he had sacrificed his own interests, only to be paid in recrimination and insinuation.

OVER TWENTY CASES AT POLICE COURT THIS WEEK.

At police court here yesterday there were over twenty cases, only a few of these being minor ones. There were several remands until next week. One of the remands was the case against Stanley Sloak. Sloak is in the hospital having been taken ill in the jail here after his arrest. He is accused of having assaulted a woman and when her husband objected Sloak is said to have smashed him in the mouth with a milk bottle, breaking nine of the husband's teeth and cutting his lips and otherwise damaging him.

Remands were also made in the cases of George Maiivolkka and Fred Panchuk who are accused of the wilful destruction of property. There were also remands for a week for A. Mondeau and J. A. Bayer, charged with theft of money from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Co.

A Kennedy and H. Lyons were each fined \$500.00 and costs and given one month in jail on charges of breach of the O.T.A. Failing the fines it will be four months each, which is what they apparently intend to take. Marie La Rose pleaded guilty to immoral living and was given a suspended sentence on the idea that she should move away to other parts right away. Chief Greer, Provincial Officer Finger and Constable Moore raided a shaft in which they found the woman, the two men and some liquor. One gallon can of liquor was thrown out of a window at the back as Chief Greer entered the shaft, but Constable Moore was stationed right there to catch the can as it came out.

J. Flaherty, for having liquor in a public place, was assessed \$50.00 and costs or two months. At the time of writing it looks like the two months. There were five drunks each contributing \$10.00 and costs. One of the five was further fined \$25.00 and costs for obstructing the police. The magistrate does not favour encouraging men who interfere with the police when the latter are making arrests. Another drunk, who was a special nuisance, was assessed the double rate of 20.00 and costs. For illegally having liquor in a public place, Geo. McDonald was fined \$50.00 and costs, the same being paid forthwith.
