LACK OF ROADS HANDICAPS PROGRESS OF THE NORTH.

In the Ontario Legislature some General Expenses: . days ago, the Premier, Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, who is now acting as Minister of Lands and Forests until such time as a successor is chosen for Hon. Jas. Lyons, made a motion for the appropriation of five million dollars for development work in the North Land. None of the members of the House had the temerity to oppose the appropriation, but some of the members of the Opposition affected to believe that the money should be voted for specified works rather than in a lump sum as the urgent needs may demand. This form of criticism was far from effective. The , Premier was able to show with ease not only that there was decided need for the expenditures, but also that such expenditures were really profitable investments so far as the Province is concerned.

The Opposition missed the point upon which fair criticism might have been made—the fact that the appro priation is inadequate in view of the pressing needs. The whole prosperity of the Province hinges on the progress of the North Land. During the past few years the development of the North Land has steadied and assisted Ontario through trying times The wealth of the North in minerals, in forests resources and in agricultural possibilities may easily mean the greatest measure of prosperity and progress for all Ontario. But to receive such dividends Ontario must make investments. There can be no proper development in this new country without roads. The need for Total Disbursements \$6364.05 cent Mail & Empire puzzle word com roads is so extended, that the problem can only be approached with success in terms of big money. The true criticism of the five million dollar appropriation is that it does not approach the problem in a big enough way. With the Government demanding of private enterprises the expenditure of at least eighty million dollars in this North in the next two years, the Opposition assuredly would be warranted in requiring the Government to appropriate at least ten mil lion dollars for the development of the North.

In the discussion in the House an interesting statement was made by Hon. Jas. Lyons. "The North won't stand much longer for the expenditure of eighty or ninety millions on roads in Southern Ontario, while they are not getting a proportionate expenditure," said Mr. Lyons. "We in the North are as much entitled to the expenditure as the old part of the province." As Minister of Lands and as a private member he may do even more. He knows the needs; he had certainly had the needs impressed upon him. He knows that the key to all effective development lies in roads and more roads. He should prove a very ally, as an independent member of the House, in the struggle to secure for the North its due chance to

make good. Hon. Mr. Lyons has suffered what may be termed the penalty of public service,-he had endured misrepresentation and abuse; he had sacrificed his own interests, only to be paid in recrimination and insinuation. may yet reap what is perhaps the only present-day reward for public service,-the consciousness that he has taken a true part in the securing of progress and prosperity for the community in which he lives, and through that community has benefitted the Province and through the Province has advantaged the whole Dominion.

"Roads and more roads!" That is the solution to the chief problems of the North! The only fair criticism for a five million dollar appropriation is that it is not enough!
