**TIMMINS CITIZENS BAND
 ELECTS ITS OFFICERS**

Annual Meeting Held at Band Room
 on Monday Evening of This
 Week

The annual meeting of the Timmings
 Citizen's Band was held in the Band
 Room, in the basement of the Separ-
 ate School, Spruce street, on Monday
 evening of this week. There was a
 good attendance of members present.
 The report of the Secretary-Treasur-
 er for the past year showed the
 Band to be in a favourable condition
 in every way. The President G. A.
 Macdonald, expressed his sincere
 thanks to the members, the executive,
 the officers, the band leader and the
 members for the fine progress made
 during the year and for the pleasant
 harmony and goodwill prevailing.

**GOVERNMENT SHOULD
 PROTECT THE SETTLERS**

For over five years a number of
 settlers in this district have waited,
 with what patience they could sum-
 mon, for the payment for pulpwood
 sold in good faith to the Mattagami
 Pulp & Paper Co. Owing to the fact
 that the settlers were induced to ac-
 cept notes for the amounts due, it was
 not possible to attach the pulpwood
 under the ordinary lien plan. The
 company went into a receivership and
 the notes were dishonoured at matur-
 ity. The settlers for the past five
 years have had to go without their
 money. While the amount is not a
 large one in the way of finance, it is
 a serious matter to the settlers who
 depend so largely upon the sale of
 pulpwood to carry on their work of
 pioneering this country. Some of the
 settlers were actually ruined by the
 failure of the company to meet its
 obligations. All of them were
 seriously handicapped and burdened.

It may be said that The Advance
 has been repeating all this regularly
 for the past five years. The answer,
 of course, is that just as regularly
 for the past five years the settlers have
 been waiting for the money due them
 and needed so badly by them.

There has been a new turn to the
 situation recently, the Mattagami
 Pulp & Paper Co. being declared in
 bankruptcy. Just what effect this may
 have upon the probabilities of pay-
 ment for the settlers would appear to
 depend upon the Government. The
 most valuable asset of the Mattagami
 Company is the list of pulpwood con-
 cessions. It is understood that the
 timber limits held by the company
 exceed in value all liabilities of all
 kinds. If this is the case, there would
 appear to be no reason why all hold-
 ing claims against the company should
 not be paid,—debenture holders, pre-
 ferred shareholders and ordinary cre-
 ditors, including the settlers. The
 Government holds the key to the situa-
 tion. When the company was in re-
 ceivership, the fact that the Govern-
 ment had stated that no transfer
 of limits would be approved until the
 settlers were paid prevented any of
 the re-organizations or sales planned.
 It would appear that the Government
 can still use its position to protect
 the settlers. If the Government
 stands firm in its attitude that no
 transfer of limits will be permitted
 until the settlers are paid, no doubt
 it will be possible to re-organize the
 Mattagami business without defaulting
 in payment to the settlers.

The debenture holders, the preferred
 creditors, and even the other ordinary
 creditors, are in position to pro-
 tect their interests by securing the
 most expert of legal talent. In this,
 of course, the settlers are naturally
 handicapped. They can form no im-
 portant combination to force their
 views. Because of their pioneering of
 the country, because of their situation
 here, they should be considered as
 special wards of the Government, and
 the Government should see that their
 interests are protected to the limit.
 The Government's attitude to the
 North Land generally is the right one,
 the fair one, the patriotic one. The
 Advance hopes that in the case of the
 Mattagami Pulp & Paper Co. and the
 settlers, the Government will con-
 tinue to show in practical fashion that
 it is a true supporter of the North
 and the people of the North.

**BIG LIST OF CASES AT
 POLICE COURT YESTERDAY**

At police court Wednesday this
 week there was a long list of cases

 costs.

 \$1.00 and costs was imposed.

 to next week. The charges against
 A. Mondeaux and J. O. Bayeur,
 preferred by the Metropolitan Life
 Co., were remanded for a week. The
 assault charge against Stanley Sloack
 was given another remand to next
 week, as was also assault charges
 against Wm. and Geo. Daigle.

**OUTSIDE WALL OF TOWNSITE
 HOUSE DAMAGED BY FIRE**

At 1.30 p.m. Wednesday of this
 week there was an alarm of fire from
 Box 43, Hollinger Townsite. The
 firemen about beat their own record
 in reaching the scene with the motor
 truck. The fire was at the residence
 of Mr. T. O. Brady, 24 Messines
 avenue, the outside of the wall at one
 side of the house being on fire. The
 fire had quite a grip on the sheeting
 of the wall, but was put out by the
 skilled use of the chemical tanks. The
 loss will likely be around \$25.00, it
 being necessary to re-cover part of
 the wall. It is not known how the
 fire originated. Perhaps a match or
 cigarette stub thrown by a passerby
 may have set fire to paper or waste
 near the wall, or boys playing nearby
 may have been responsible.
