While the amount is not a large one in the way of finance, it is Perrault. a serious matter to the settlers who depend so largely upon the sale of pulpwood to carry on their work of pioneering this country. Some of the settlers were actually ruined by the failure of the company to meet its obligations. All of them were seriously handicapped and burdened.

It may be said that The Advance has been repeating all this regularly for the past five years. The answer, of course, is that just as regularly for the past five years the settlers have been waiting for the money due them and needed so badly by them.

There has been a new turn to th situation recently, the Mattagami Pulp & Paper Co. being declared in bankrupcy. Just what effect this may plause. have upon the probabilities of pay ment for the settlers would appear to depend upon the Government. The most valuable asset of the Mattagami Company is the list of pulpwood concessions. It is understood that the timber limits held by the company exceed in value all liabilities of al kinds.
