"Nine international players, whose (3) "Every application shall be addressed to the Provincial Apiarist, soccer, are included in the touring Ontario Agricultural College, Guelph'

(4) "Where a person commences keeping bees after the 30th day of April in any year, he shall apply for a certificate of registration as hereinbefore provided within ten days after coming into possession of the bees."

(5) "Every person keeping bees who neglects or refuses to comply keeper; played for England against with the provisions of this section shall incur a penalty of not less than 1914; 5 ft. 111/2 in.; 174 lbs. Pre- \$5 and not more than \$10 and costs.

3 (1) "The owner or possessor of an apiary shall not sell, barter, give well; goalkeeper; 5 ft. 10 in.; 168 lbs; away or remove from the premises any bees or used apiary appliances or apparatus until he has secured a certificate from the Provincial Apiarist that such bees, used apiary appliances or apparatus have been properly disinfected and are free from dis-

> Bee keeping in Temiskaming District has become quite an important industry and its future depends very from diseases, especially Foul Brood.

As already stated, the above regulations are to protect, first the Beekeeper himself, and second, the prospective Bee-keeper.

Professor F. E. Millen; Provincial Apiarist who is directly in charge of Ontario Bee-keeping, will be very glad to give full information at any time in reference to the interpretation of the Act and it's application to the prevention of the spread of dis-


