## Will Travel Be By Auto or By T.&N.O. to James Bay?

Mr. Harry A. Preston, Old-timer of the North, has Great Faith in the Far North. Thinks the Lord Knew What He Was Doing when He Made "New Ontario and the Rest of the World" in Six Days.

The following letter from the old-timer of the North Land, Mr. H. A. Preston, will give the people something to think about:—

"Who was the first man to predict there would be a T.&N.O. Railway built into Porcupine? Well, he is right in Schumacher! When he and a Frenchman took moss off the Dome and saw that gold, he at once exclaimed! Holy Gee! By gosh! You'll see the T.&N.O. Railway build into here. And I guess he told the truth!"

"Now he thinks the railway should have been built into James Bay, and once the railway is there someone surely could form a company called the James Bay Navigation Co., with small craft to take prospectors and others up the west and east coasts to the dozens of large rivers coming from inland, some right from near Red Lake. Into these rivers flow dozens of smaller streams from north and south, and the prospectors could get in there and most surely some great mines will be discovered."

"But now that the Hudson Bay Railway is going to be built to Port Nelson, if Red Lake proves a good thing, it looks as though the prospector will be turned in that direction, instead of to James Bay by T.&N.O. They will go to Nelson and come down the west shore of the Bay to those rivers that lead to Red Lake district, whereas if our own T.&N.O. were to be built to the Bay there would be both the east and the west coasts easy of access. Even supposing the railway did not pay, then take up the tracks and a good auto road even could be made of it, and believe me thousands of cars would go the trip to James Bay. Just wait till the

road from North Bay to Cochrane is in shape for autos! Watch our Yankee friends coming and going like they do from the Western States to Montreal by way of Sault Ste. Marie and Sudbury every summer.

"There are many people who call themselves Canadians and who even have the nerve to condemn the country from Cochrane to James Bay and beyond, just like they did when our T.&N.O. was started from North Bay. Any man who said there would be great gold and silver mines discovered was looked upon as having something wrong with his head. Yes, lots of such people have made fortunes, and yet to-day they think nothing good exists beyond Porcupine."

## COAL NORTH OF COCHRANE EQUAL TO DRUMHELLER

So Says Visitor from West After Careful Examination and Investigation.

Speaking of the coal fields north of Cochrane, The Cochrane News last week says:—

"The coal deposits to the North of us appear to be proving out very well. The drilling work on the interests of Mr. McCarthy and his associates has yielded most hopeful results. A seam of what appears to be bituminous bed some eleven feet thick has been reached within sixty-five feet of the surface."

"A gentleman who has been for many years intimately connected with coal-mining in Alberta has visited the area and made careful enquiries and investigations and has given us some instructive and exceedingly encouraging information. Information of this kind coming from a practical coal-mining man who has satisfied himself as to the prospect to such an extent that he proposes to devote his time and financial resources there is most reassuring. In acquiring this information and assuming that all men were liars or fools, he questioned all who had anything to do with the development work as far as it has gone. Both from his examination and the information received, he feels that the formation is just as promising as that in the Drumheller area and that a small sample of the coal when taken from the above mentioned seam was in every way equal to that of the Drumheller product."

"While a sample of coal might be taken from a locomotive and represented as the product of this work, to a lay man, such misrepresentation would not deceive a man who has been working in coal mines for many years and he is quite certain that it came from this seam and that it is equal to the Drumheller coal."

"He believes that there is an immense opening for capital to be profitably invested."

## F.A. FOURTH EMPIRE TOUR GREAT RECORD TO UPHOLD

Timmings Hopes to Put a Crimp in the Record of the F.A. Team for South Africa and Australia

Billy Fenton, the popular sports writer for The Toronto Telegram, had an interesting article in last Saturday's issue relative to the record of the Old Country touring team in playing 60 games in South Africa and Australia without a single loss. This is of interest here, in view of the fact that the touring English F.A. team will be in Timmings for a game on July 7th. However, the Timmings Football team in keeping up their own record will have to see that the touring F.A. team record referred to is broken. Sure thing!

The article by Billy Fenton in part is as follows:—

"The football reputation of the Old Country will be in safe keeping when the F.A. team lands in Canada on May 23 for a coast-to-coast tour. This will be the fourth Empire tour, and it is on record that not a single game has been lost or even drawn, of the 60 played in South Africa and Australia. This record the F.A. fully anticipate upholding, otherwise they would not have sent over a team which includes nine men of international calibre, past and present. The original intention was to send over a team composed of professional and amateur players, but of the eighteen elected to travel, only one, J. W. Booker, the Nunhead halfback, is an amateur. Seven first division clubs will be represented. Huddersfield, Sheffield United, Leeds United, Blackburn Rovers, Bolton Wanderers, West Bromwich Albions and Birmingham. Second division clubs to be represented are Southampton, Portsmouth, Middlesborough and Barnsley. The records of previous Empire tours shows:

"In the second South African tour Joe Smith, the Bolton Wanderer captain and inside-left, who is included in the team to visit Canada, scored 24 goals in fewer games, and his eye has not lost its cunning or his foot its propelling power."

"Joe Smith, the Bolton Wanderers' inside-left, who is fond of overseas tours, asked his directors to submit his name as a candidate for the Canadian tour and Joe is coming. What a pity he could not bring Ted Vizard along with him and thus complete the Burden Park dazzling left wing. The pair may be veterans but it says much for their good-wearing qualities that Bolton cannot get better players to take their places and they do not want to yet awhile. Veterans with touches of grey appearing in their black hair, but both Smith and Vizard are still wonderful footballers. After all these years their understanding is complete and there is nothing that they do not know of in the art of combination."
