The new mill of the Porcupine Paymaster Gold Mines, Ltd., began operations on Wednesday, April 14th. This fine new mill has a present capacity of 125 tons and was designed by Mr. B. D. Kelly, of Timmins, who is also the Consulting Engineer. Mr. W. W. Hudson is Supt. of Construction, and Mr. R. E. Vary, formerly of the Dome Mines, is Mill foreman. There are at present about sixty men employed in the mill and over thirty in the underground workings of this mine. This new structure is a fine type of cyanide mill, designed to use the double ration process. By July 1st it is expected that its capacity will be increased to 350 tons. The 5 by 16 Ball Tube mill is on the ground at present and all the other equipment is on order, with which to take care of this increased capacity. The foundation for the new hoist, which is being installed, is also laid. This hoist will have a much larger capacity

than the old one. The outlook for this mine is a bright one and now that the well-known rich ore of the Paymaster is being milled on their own property great expectations for a real future for this mine, that is gradually working up to one of the best are very logical.

**NATIONAL FOREST POLICY URGENTLY REQUIRED NOW**

A booklet issued by the Dominion Government in connection with the "Save the Forest Week" has the following pointed paragraphs:—

"The present situation in Canada with regard to forest depletion is unsatisfactory. We are eating into our forest capital year by year at an alarming rate. Losses through forest fires and their attendant evils of insect depredations and disease constitute a national problem. The solution of the problem is possible only by concerted co-operative action on the part of the federal and provincial governments, backed by a strong public opinion, and expressed in a concrete, well-defined, and efficiently administered national forest policy."

"The basis of this policy must be the segregation to their true economic use of all lands in the Dominion which are valuable only for timber production. Settlement must be directed into agricultural areas, leaving the forest lands for the purpose intended by nature, namely, the growing of trees."

"This basic requirement means land-classification by the government administering the land resource. Timbered districts must be subjected to intensive survey, and agricultural and true forest lands must be definitely and finally demarcated. The next step is the permanent dedication by statute of the true forest lands for use in timber production or watershed protection. In this way, and in this way only, can there be provided to the several forest authorities the facilities which will enable them to establish methods of protection and to establish proper methods of management."

"Few people realize the urgent need which exists for a forest policy in Canada. The economic facts are that the forest is second only to agriculture in production of commodity values, and it contributes to-day one-quarter of Canada's total export trade. Therefore, continued depletion of raw materials essential to the well-being of the forest industries is a direct menace to our national prosperity."

"It may well be repeated that owing to inadequate protection and extravagant use, Canada's supply of softwoods is now only two-fifths that of her strongest competitor, the United States, despite her larger forest area. Canada's future is dependent, in no small degree, on the way in which the remaining timber supply is husbanded and its annual growth increased."

### EXCURSION FROM NORTH LAND TO OLD COUNTRY

In response to numerous demands, arrangements have just been completed by the Robert Reford Co. Limited, for an excursion for passengers from the Temiskaming district of Ontario to the Old Country. The excursion will sail by the Cunard liner "Ansonia," leaving Montreal at 10.00 a.m. on July 3rd, for Plymouth and London, returning from Southampton in the Cunard liner "Ascania," August 14th. Both these vessels are of the new post-war, 14,000 ton type, and although new, have already proved to be popular steamers on the St. Lawrence Route.
