North Bay is making special preparation for the big State Convention of the K. of C. to be held at North Bay on June 8th and 9th. It is expected that there will be 300 or more visitors to North Bay for this convention.

ALGOMA ASSOCIATION ASKING CLOSE SEASON

On innumerable occasions The Advance has urged the need for better protection of fish and game in this country. Within the last few years public indifference in the matter has been followed by an astonishing depletion of the fish and game in this country. Just a few years ago there was abundance of fish and game in this area. It does not take much ability to see how the present rate of depletion will mean extermination of fish and game. And all for the need of concerted action to preserve the national resources in these lines. The Advance particularly commends the careful perusal of the following paragraph from the letter from the Algoma Fish, Game and Forest Association. The letter says:—

"The recently organized Algoma Game, Fish and Forest Association is about to commence a big movement for the protection of beaver in the north, and will ask for a close season this fall. With this end in view the Association solicits your support. Other game and fish associations have promised aid which will make the movement province wide. Reports from all over the district are to the effect that the present regulations, which confine the trapping of beaver to treaty Indians, are a farce, and that white men are now openly evading the law, disposing of their pelts to the Indians and in some cases offering them openly to unscrupulous fur dealers. As a result the beaver has all but disappeared. He maintained a gallant fight against terrible odds during the past five years, and the time has arrived when the north must become a unit to prevent his extermination. It will take years to bring the beaver back, if it can be done at all. We will ask for a close season of five years."
