NO POISON IN STOMACH OF SUPPOSED SUICIDE

The Northern News last week says: "While no official word has been received here yet by the provincial police engaged in the case it is learned from Toronto that the examination made of the stomach of Neil Aldo, the young Finn who died in a lumber camp near Boston Creek on February 16 last in circumstances that suggested suicide, has been completed and that no trace of poison was found. No date has yet been set for the resumption of the adjourned inquest, so far as the police are aware. When the proceedings were opened before the coroner on February 19 the hearing was adjourned until the stomach of the victim could be sent to the provincial laboratory at Toronto for examination. This has now been done, it is stated, and an official report will be forwarded within a short time."

MANY PROSPECTORS TO GO INTO LOCHALSH AREA

Writing about the Lochalsh-Goudreau area, a Toronto Mail & Empire representative says:

"Judging by the inquiries being received daily, this Summer will see a large influx of new prospectors into the Lochalsh-Goudreau area. Information regarding the field is being sought by intending new-comers in a manner not hitherto experienced, and with the break-up indications are that a definite movement—not to say something of a rush—will be seen toward this promising field.

"For the information of those, intending to enter the field for the first time it may be stated that the snow is disappearing very rapidly, and no

doubt the first week in May will see excellent conditions for prospecting. The field may be entered at Lochalsh, on the main line of the C.P.R., or at Goudreau, on the Algoma Central Railway, and sleeping accommodation may be obtained at either point. A

general trucking and stage service is now available at Lochalsh, and transport of equipment and supplies can readily be made to almost any point in the field from that railway point. A road connects this end of the field with Goudreau, and the new stage service makes it unnecessary for prospectors coming in by the C.P.R. to go to Franz (as in the past) and then down the A.C.R. to Goudreau in order to reach properties in the western section of the field. Heretofore much time has been consumed making this somewhat roundabout trip, and this may now be eliminated by stopping at Lochalsh. Parties coming from Sault Ste. Marie will still find it convenient to reach the properties in the western part of the field from Goudreau, but in the eastern section Lochalsh is on the whole the more convenient point of entry.

"Supplies may be purchased at Goudreau or Lochalsh, and excellent mail service is to be had at both points. Lochalsh has a mail twice daily, and Goudreau is served daily, except Sunday."

SIGNAL HONOUR GIVEN THE MINISTER OF MINES
