### J. A. HOUGH LIKELY TO BE THE CROWN LANDS AGENT

A despatch from Matheson last week says:-

"The appointment of J. A. Hough to the position of Crown Lands agent for the District of Cochrane, succeed. ing J. E. Mills, who has resigned, is expected to be made public by the Ontario Government in the near future It is understood that Mr. Mills' resignation has been placed in the hands of the premier, who is in charge of the portfolio of Lands and Forests, and that the appointment of Mr. Hough has been already decided. Mr. Mills was appointed to the position here in 1921. His successor is well known throughout the North Country, having held a local magistracy for some time. Of recent years he has been engaged in promoting the dairy industry here and has held the position of secretary of the Matheson Cooperative Dairy Company."

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
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
