**J. A. HOUGH LIKELY TO BE
THE CROWN LANDS AGENT**

A despatch from Matheson last week says:

"The appointment of J. A. Hough to the position of Crown Lands agent for the District of Cochrane, succeeding J. E. Mills, who has resigned, is expected to be made public by the Ontario Government in the near future. It is understood that Mr. Mills' resignation has been placed in the hands of the premier, who is in charge of the portfolio of Lands and Forests, and that the appointment of Mr. Hough has been already decided. Mr. Mills was appointed to the position here in 1921. His successor is well known throughout the North Country, having held a local magistracy for some time. Of recent years he has been engaged in promoting the dairy industry here and has held the position of secretary of the Matheson Co-operative Dairy Company."

**RED LAKE CENTRE MINES
MEETING GOOD SUCCESS**

A correspondent last week writing from Hudson, Ont., says that the financing of the Red Lake Centre Mines, Ltd., is stated to have been meeting with excellent success, and has enabled directors to lay plans for work on an aggressive and important scale.

The company is conservatively capitalized at 300,000 shares, a limited number of which has been sold through the firm of C. W. Evans and Co., Toronto. The company holds a acreage adjoining the Howey Gold Mines on the south-east corner. The group has a length of approximately one mile, and a width of about half a mile. The rock formation is keewatin, in which porphyry intrusions are stated to occur.

The extensive diamond drilling operations which Dome Mines Company is carrying on on the Howey Gold Mines within sight of the Red Lake Centre Mines is expected to disclose information which will be of extremely important value to Red Lake Centre. Provisions, equipment and men will be sent in just as quickly as possible after the break-up.

**TWO TOWNSHIPS WOO SOUTH
LORRAIN AND LORRAIN**

Apparently both Coleman Township and Bucke Township are after Lorrain and South Lorrain with a view to an early wedding, and all divorce cases barred. In the meantime, Lorrain and South Lorrain are having love and attention showered upon them by both Coleman and Bucke. "Watch out for the other fellow," says one. "Codlin's your friend not Short," says the other. Coleman has proposed to enlarge its municipal boundaries by absorbing Lorrain and South Lorrain. In opposition to this, Bucke Township wants to take in Lorrain and South Lorrain, and intends to apply to the Railway & Municipal Board along this line. Reeve Post, of Bucke Township, has sent a letter to the unorganized townships referred to, showing them all the good things that will follow joining up with Bucke. If Coleman desires to expand, Reeve Post suggests that Coleman could take in Gillies Limit. Anyway, Bucke Township wants Lorrain and South Lorrain.

**T. & N. O. COMMISSION HAVE
FINE REPORTS FOR NORTH**

Business Going to be Good. Prospects Excellent. T. & N. O. Commission Banquets Hon. C. McCrea at Haileybury

The T. & N. O. Railway Commission keeps in the closest touch with conditions and prospects in this North Land, and reports by the Commission on the situation in this North are sure to be accurate and helpful. Accordingly the following from the last issue of The North Bay Nugget will be of more than passing interest:

"That business in Northern Ontario is good for this season of the year, and that mining is in a flourishing condition are the encouraging reports that members of the T. & N. O. Railway Commission carried away from the series of meeting and gatherings held in Northern Ontario, this week. The members of the commission gave a banquet to the Hon. Charles McCrea, Minister of Mines, at Haileybury on Tuesday, when representatives of Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard were present. They also attended a similar banquet at Timmins and held two business meetings in North Bay. Through these gatherings the members of the commission came into contact with leading business men of the North and well-known industrial heads, so that their reports are gathered from first hand sources.

"At their North Bay meetings, the commission members made a survey of the line with a view to planning the summer's work and prepared the expenditures for this work. A part of this work will be started on Monday morning when a gang of men will commence the laying of twenty-five miles of new heavy steel rail to replace the older in service. This work is being done in anticipation of an unusually heavy season.

"Fifty persons were seated at the banquet tendered the Hon. Charles McCrea in Haileybury's new hotel on Tuesday. Addresses of welcome were given by the mayors of Cobalt, Haileybury and New Liskeard, the three rival towns coming together to do honour to one of Northern Ontario's most untiring friends, Ontario's Minister of Mines.

"In Timmins, the members of the commission met with a number of citizens and announced their decision to go on at once with the construction of the subway which, when completed, will form the final link in the completion of the main highway of the northern town."

**DEATH OF MRS. HUNSBURGER
AT HEARST ON APRIL 22ND**

**NORTHERN ONTARIO SEED
GRAIN THE BEST THERE IS**

W. G. Nixon, of New Liskeard Recommends North Land Farmers to Pay Special Attention to Seed Grain

In an interview at Toronto, Mr. W. G. Nixon, of the Experimental Farm at New Liskeard, said that the great clay belt of Northern Ontario, consisting of an estimated area of 16,000,000 acres of arable land, will in time be a very vital factor in provincial agriculture, as well as of the Dominion.

"Now would seem to be the time to lay the foundation for establishing grades, markets and other things which must be considered in connection with building of a well stabilized Temiskaming agriculture," said Mr. Nixon, adding:—"We do not recommend that any farmer should go exclusively into the production of seed grain and grass seed, but rather that in conjunction with his livestock programme he give a fair amount of consideration to the production of high-class Northern-grown seed. It has, and is being demonstrated, every year, that the clay belt produces cereals and legumes that grade large in size and consequently are high in feeding value."

**OFFICERS OF TIMMINS
GROUNDS COMMITTEE**

In giving a report last week of the annual meeting of the Timmins Amateur Athletic Association (usually called the Grounds Committee), The Advance omitted the officers elected for the year. Mr. A. Borland, Sr., was again elected President, by acclamation, and the secretary-treasurer, Mr. W. A. Field, was also re-elected by acclamation for the ensuing year. With the President and Secretary, the committee in charge for the year are:—H. W. Hooker, representing baseball; Geo. Pond, representing football; W. O. Langdon, representing tennis; W. G. Smith, representing softball; and Mr. C. G. Williams, for the Hollinger Mine. There will be general agreement that this appears to be a particularly strong committee.

**NIGHT HAWK NEGOTIATING
WITH THE POWER COMPANY**

Reports that the Night Hawk Peninsular Mines intended to continue operations this summer by running their plant by steam power, and that the property on the other hand intended to close down tight, are alike not quite correct. So far as can be learned, the Night Hawk is attempting to negotiate with the Power Co. to have them continue to supply 60-cycle power to the mine. It is understood that the Dept. of Mines has lent assistance in the negotiations. If it is impossible for them to secure the 60-cycle power it will be necessary to close down for a time, as the cost of changing over from 60 to 25 cycle is prohibitive at present for the Night Hawk. It is understood that the Night Hawk will keep the shaft pumped out and everything ready to start again at any time, in case a temporary close-down is necessary on account of the power question. The Night Hawk is endeavouring to secure additional capital, and if this is forthcoming immediately, there will be no close-down. It is said that recently the Night Hawk has been meeting with excellent success, and the mill has been running very smoothly, with good recovery.

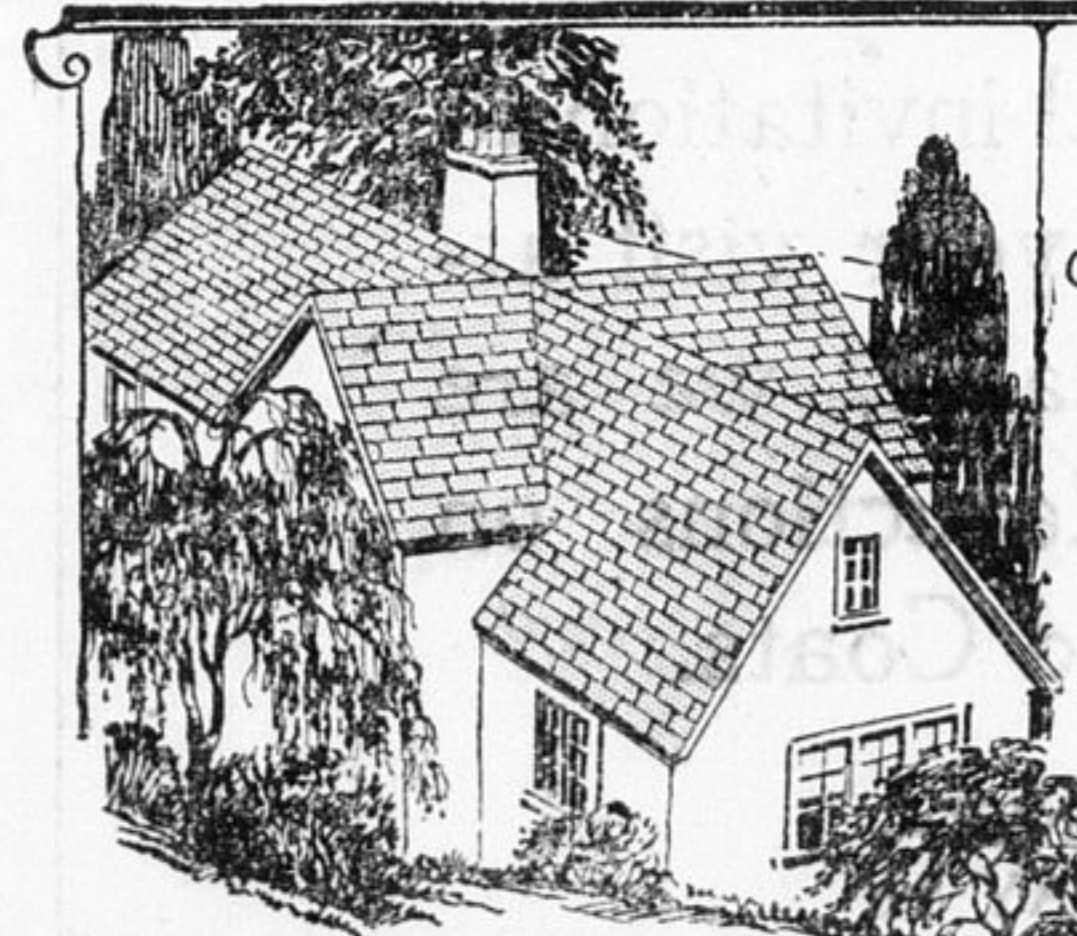
