In referring to the organization of the fire rangers for the district under Supervisor Fred Hamilton, The Cochrane Post last week says that further addition to the equipment is expected but owing to the weather conditions no special rush is needed for this, but in case of a dry spell there is the assurance that the territory will be efficiently looked after; and considering the general conditions around here brought about by two wet seasons, there naturally must be a great deal of anxiety until the overburden of slash on the different homesteads is satisfactorily disposed of. This part of the work will be looked after immediately when the time arrives to start burning, but again, we must caution the settlers to consult and co-operate with the fire rangers about starting fires.

"From what we hear from Mr. Hamilton," says The Post, "it is the intention to have the surroundings of the towns and villages looked after immediately the weather conditions permit, and the towns and villages should at the same time clean up in their own limits. It is all a question of weather, but having had two wet seasons in succession, greater precautions than ever will have to be taken in order to avoid repetition of previous catastrophes."
