CHANGES IN BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF MONETA MINE

At the meeting of shareholders in New York recently, several changes were made in the Board of Directors of the Moneta Porcupine Mines, Ltd. Capt. R. S. Segsworth, of Toronto, was elected to the Presidency. It was decided to bring the head office from New York to Toronto, as by so doing the Directors would reduce expenses. The Company is reported to be in a sound position, with approximately \$100,000 in liquid assets. The Directors have decided it is understood, to consider plans for securing additional funds and to inaugurate a development programme on the property. The shares advanced from 12 cents to 17 cents, between trades on that day, and, in this connection, it is interesting to note that the Company's by-laws prohibit the sale of treasury stock at less than 20 cents a share; consequently, any new financing plans involving the sale of shares would be probably arranged above that level. There are reported to be 1,000,000 shares in the treasury.
