At any rate it would appear that Sudbury is not a good place to leave a woman. The sad story of Pete Kuzman and his wife and another man is thus told by The Sudbury Star in its last issue:-

Mike had received injuries to his head which necessitated twenty-one stitches to close.

Kuzman said Ochas had attacked him with a knife and that the billy was used by Mrs. Kuzman to assist Ochas. In the struggle which followed, Kuzman testified that he had taken the billy from Ochas and hit him over the

"Mrs. Kuzman said her husband had been absent in Timmins since Christmas and during that time had sent her no money for support. She had been forced to open a lodging house in order to keep herself and children. Kuzman denied this, saying he had left \$350 to keep her until March when he had intended coming home, selling the house and moving to Timmins. He had received only one letter from her since Christmas. He had not been aware of the conditions existing between his wife and Ochas until his arrival that night."

STOLLONI SENTENCED TO LONG TERM IMPRISONMENT

Readers will remember the case of Stolloni, arrested by Chief C. McInnis, of Tisdale, on a murder charge. Stolloni has had several trials or retrials, in one of them being sentenced to the extreme penalty. His latest trial is referred to last week as follows by The Cobalt News:-

"Sergeant Frank Gardner, of the provincial police force, Cobalt, re turned home on Sunday from attending a murder trial at Scranton, Pa. and his experience is an interesting commentary on the method of selecting a jury in that state of the Union. The proceedings commenced on Monday, and when court adjourned for the day on Wednesday the third juror had just been elected. Four panels, of 20 men each, had been exhausted, and one-quarter of the necessary "twelve good men and true" had been obtained by that time. Many prospective jutors escaped service by declaring themselves opposed to capital punishment in the event of a conviction being registered, while some who were satisfactory to the prosecution did not meet with favor by defence counsel, and also were turned down. Finally, the accused through his lawyer, agreed to plead guilty to murder in the second degree, and he was sentenced to from 10 to 20 years on each of the three charges. The prisoner was an Italian named Stoled as far as Porcupine."
