For many years his family were respected residents of South Porcupine but a few years ago

they removed to Saskatoon. Mrs. Devine and Miss Muriel came from there immediately on receiving word of his illness and will take the body back to Saskatoon for burial. His brother, Adam, and his son, John were also here from Buckingham, Quebec. Mr. Devine did not notify anyone of his illness until it had reached an advanced stage and by the time he was taken to the hospital little could be done for him. Besides his widow there are left to mourn his loss, four daughters and three sons:—Maud, Elizabeth and Muriel of Saskatoon, Mrs. A. Beaumont (Ida) of Ponoka, Alberta, Ambrose and Percy, of Assiniboia, and Ernest of Zealandia. Three brothers, Adam and Sam of Buckingham, Que. and John of Semans, Sask., also two sisters, Mrs. A. MacMillan, Ottawa, and Mr. Jno. Moar, of Semans, Sask., survive. There were many floral tributes from friends, among them being a wreath from Mayor E. G. Dickson, of Timmins.

TISDALE POLICE DO SOME CLEVER DETECTIVE WORK

Slim Clues Used to Discover Assaultants of Man Found Unconscious on Street

About half-past five on Wednesday afternoon of last week Mike Okala was found unconscious on a Schumacher street with his head split open. Near him was a stick of wood with bloodstains on it, believed to be the weapon with which the man was injured. Officer Fulton acting chief of police for Tisdale during the absence of Chief McInnis, was notified, and he and Officer James Cushing got busy on the case in prompt and effective fashion. First, the injured man was removed to the Providence Hospital, Timmins, and then steps were taken to discover those responsible for the injuries. There were no clues of any moment to work upon. All the police could learn was that there had been three men in some sort of quarrel and that one of them was left unconscious on the street. One of the men escaping had a cloth around one finger and the other had a shield over one eye. With this meagre description the police set out to find the two wanted men, and it speaks much for their efficiency when it can be said that before the night ended the two were under arrest, being found at South Porcupine. They were brothers, Charles and Matti Makela, and one of them had a bottle on him, and so last week was fined \$50.00 and costs. They were remanded to this week on the assault charge. In the meantime, Mike Okala, the injured man, is making good progress to recovery and according to accounts will soon be as well as ever, though perhaps marked a little from the fray.
