AGAINST PETITION FOR UNION SCHOOL SECTION.

To accommodate pupils living in the Bartleman Townsite, a petition was presented to Timmins Council asking for the formation of a union school section. Under the union school section plan proposed the pupils in question could attend Timmins public school. In return, the properties in Bartleman Townsite owned by public school supporters would pay school taxes to Timmins. The petitioners last week received a letter from the Town Clerk reading as follows:—"I am instructed by the Mayor to notify you that the Council are not favourable to the formation of a Union School Section as described in your petition of Feb. 8th." If the union school section plan can not be proceeded with, despite the disapproval of the Council, and if the Council continues its present attitude, then the only feasible plan apparently will be erection by Tisdale of a school on or near the Townsite. This will be a more or less expensive matter for Tisdale, and Timmins will lose the school taxes involved. But, unless the building of homes on the townsite is stopped, something should be done as early a date as possible. For this reason several signed the petition who had no other thought or connection with the matter than the assurance of educational facilities for the families on the new townsite.
