STORMY SPECIAL SESSION OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Unique Resolution Passed by Mayor's Casting Vote. Services of More Employees Dispersed With.

There was a protracted special session of the Town Council last Wednesday evening, and from all accounts it was a most remarkable session, with one of the oddest resolutions on record of any municipality being passed by the casting vote of the Mayor. This resolution appears to develop from a discussion over one of the town employees who accepted a small amount of work on his property while the town was doing similar work nearby. Some of the Councillors talked as if this were a desperate thing deserving of roasting, crucifying and boiling in oil, though it is the sort of thing that happens in practically every business and with practically all employees. It is the sort of thing equivalent to an office employee using the firm's stamp for a personal letter, or a candy store clerk eating a pop-sicle without paying for it. Councillor Longmore admitted that it was not strictly proper, but he was not in favour of dismissal of an employee, whose services were valuable and whose character was of the highest, for so petty a matter. Then the following resolution was presented to the meeting and seriously voted upon:—
"Moved by A. P. Brennan, seconded by S. G. Eplett, that Councillor Longmore is in favour of retaining a man on the municipal payroll who is dishonest."

Councillors Longmore, Bacon and Drew voted against this remarkable motion. Councillors Brennan, Joyal and Eplett voted for it. The Mayor gave his casting vote for the motion. The motion may be on the minute book, but there is no fair-minded, sane citizen who believes other than that Councillor Longmore has the highest standards of honour and morality. For many years he has been held in the highest esteem and respect by all because of his high standards of life and conduct,—standards that he lives, rather than talks about.

Other resolutions passed at the special meeting of council were as follows:

Moved by S. G. Eplett, seconded by Geo. S. Drew, that rent for house occupied by Mrs. Androuchek and owned by Hymok be paid from January 1st, 1926, to June 30th, 1926, and that same be applied on taxes due against property,—carried.
